IGA Athletics top Brampton

Last week at Cedarvale Park, the Georgetown IGA Athletic soccer team continued its recent improvement by handing the visiting Brampton squad a 2-1 loss in a Peel-Halton minor mosquito match-up.
The victory was far from easy against a tenacious Brampton team that took the lead 20 seconds into the contest.
Fortunately, this immediate reversal did not stun the local players, who regrouped quickly under the inspiring example of their captain, Mike Melville. His effort and skill in midfield were matched by Wade Serjeantson and Chad Bailey, both of whom demonstrated their determination to win. Within 20 minutes, these three players were dominating

possession and providing probing passes to the Georgetown forwards.
Finally, Mark Lorito again rushed past his defensive cover down the right wing. Near the end line, he hit a hard low cross which the visiting goalkeeper, under pressure from the other Georgetown forwards, found too hot to handle cleanly. When the ball squirmed loose, Jimmy English pounced on it and shot it into the net for a deserved equalizer.
For the remainder of the half, the Brampton team held a slight advantage. Were it not for the uncompromising tackling of Steve Alchin and Rich Sowers on the defensive flanks and the courage and safe handling of Nicky Varrichio in the Georgetown net, the visitors might have recaptured their lead.

From the restart, the home squad dominated play for long periods. Darren Gray, in particular, directed several worthy shots at the visitors' net, only to be frustrated.
The danger of a break-away score by the opposition was always present, especially as the Brampton forwards moved swiftly when in possession. However, Robbie Lockhurst chased back with equal speed and tackled with biting ferocity. Paul St. Pierre played his role of sweeper with cool anticipation, competently intercepting passes before the visitors could set up dangerous shooting opportunities.
When it appeared that the game might end in a tie, despite the territorial superiority of the local squad, the winning goal was scored with a spec-

tacular shot. With five minutes remaining, yet another Georgetown flurry was partially cleared only for the ball to drop at the feet of Derek Woolgar. From about 30 meters out, Woolgar hit a drive over the Brampton defence and into the roof of the net.
After a poor start to the season, the IGA Athletics have won their last two home games. It now remains to be seen whether the improvement, especially in desire and effort, will also be evident on the road. Tonight's game in Burlington, a generally inhospitable location for visiting teams, will indicate what the players may expect in the second half of the season.

Nicole Remedios scored all three Golden Gal goals in their 3-1 win over the Blue Bandits.



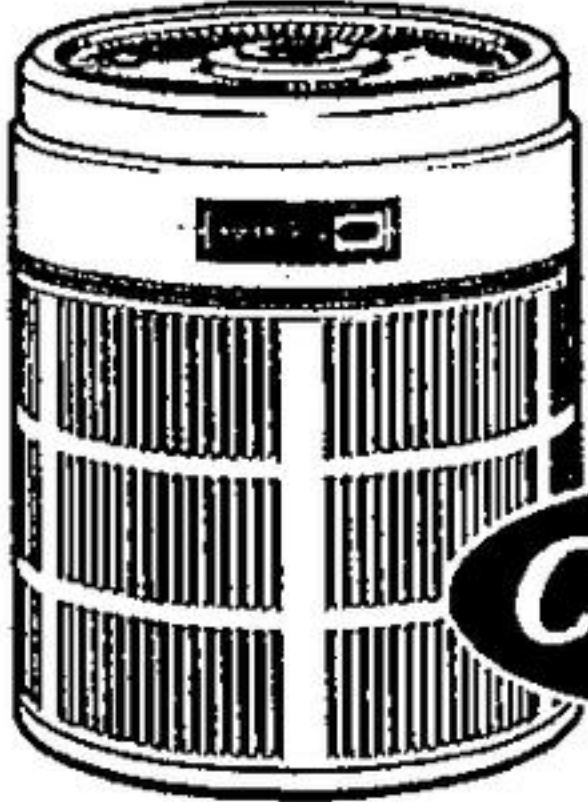

Georgetown cricket club honored

The Georgetown cricket team was doubly honored over the past weekend when one of its members was selected to represent the Lt. Governor's XI against York Cricket Club in an annual charity match on Satur-

day at Glendon College. On Sunday the team won the runners-up award after reaching the finals in an invitational, six-a-side tournament at Marigall, Hockley Valley.

Ashley Windsor is the Georgetown player who received the unique honor

of playing for the Lt. Governor's team in the match which featured two former English Test players, John Edrich and Brian Close. This game was won by York, 200 to 167 runs.

In the six-a-side tournament at Marigall, six teams participated including the hosts Marigall C.C., along with Georgetown and Mississauga and the Toronto teams Goa, Sri Lanka, and Spartans.

In the preliminary rounds Georgetown lost to Marigall but then went on to defeat both Mississauga and Goa to reach the finals. The scores in the games in

which the local team was involved are as follows: Georgetown 33 vs. Marigall 34; Georgetown 60 vs. Mississauga 42; Georgetown 48 vs. Goa 35.

Georgetown also achieved the unique distinction of amassing the highest total in the tournament by scoring 60 runs in five overs against Mississauga Ramblers.

In the final match Georgetown again came up against Marigall, who had defeated them in the first round.

They were off to a fairly good start scoring 15 runs in the first two overs but the batsmen found it difficult to make attacking strokes against defensive

bowling and were all out for 47 runs. Marigall, at their turn to bat, wiped out this total with two overs to spare, winning the tournament and recapturing the trophy which was won by Spartans last year.

This is the fifth year that Georgetown has participated in this tournament and it is the first time that they have reached the finals. Congratulations are due to the six players, Ashok Kumar (Capt.), Ashley Windsor, Allan Dean, Nirvan Balkisson, David Anthony, and Lal Moolchan. The official scorer was Mrs. Christina Samaroo.
