# Wrecker faces charges

A local wrecking yard faces charges for violations of the town's licensing bylaw.

Halton Auto Wreckers of Limehouse was singled out at Monday night's council meeting for violations which range from unkempt fences to stockpiling cars too high.

Council decided to have bylaw enforcement officer Jack Lusty press charges rather than hold a special tribunal to decide whether or not to revoke the firm's operating license.

Esquesing Coun. Pam Sheldon failed to convince council to hold the tribunal, arguing that Halton Auto Wreckers has had ample opportunity to make the necessary changes.

As she described problems at the wrecking yard, Acton Coun. Dave Whiting warned that she may be giving evidence which should be heard only at the time of the tribunal.

With the information Coun. Sheldon was handing out at the moment, he said he wouldn't sit on a

tribunal. CHANGE BYLAW? Instead, councillors opted to press charges under the existing licensing bylaw and will consider changes later to clear up ambiguities in the legislation.

Coun. Sheldon said the fence around the wrecking yard is not of solid structure as outlined in the bylaw, but made of a mixture of materials. In addition, some vehicles have been left outside the yard when they probably should have been behind the fence.

Mr. Lusty said the town can present charges for a bearing the first Thursday of every month at Milton county court.

Meanwhile, a request from another wrecking

yard owner to waive the stockpiling regulation for six months, was turned down by council.


Dave Humphrey of Watson Auto parts said the market for scrap metal is expected to pick up by that time and he can unload his stockpiled cars at a better price. With the current slump in scrap metal, he said, he stands to lose \$10 to \$15 per ton if he has to get rid of the wrecked vehicles now.

Mr. Humphrey said the cars are neatly placed within the fence and are compacted by a crusher.

Mayor Pete Pomeroy maintained that council

needs to treat all wrecking yards the same.

### Intervene in tussle

# Specters win pair

The Glen Williams Specters rode the long ball to a 4-2 victory over Alton in Inter County Fastball League action

Wednesday night. The first batter of the game, Glen third sacker Tim Flelds, gave the Specters a 1-0 lead when he smacked a round-

tripper. Two outs later, pitcher Jeff Haines singled, and he moved to third on an error. Terry Haines then delivered his brother with an RBI single.

Next time around, the Specters added two more. First baseman. Mike Reynolds unloaded a tworun shot, with Jackie Bergman aboard.

Pitcher Haines survived a shaky second inning. in which he gave up a one-out solo homer to Phil Wilkins, and three straight singles after that, to register a sevenhit, 10-strikeout performance for the win.

Tuesday night in the Glen, the Specters thrilled the home town fans by pushing across four runs in the ninth for a 5-4 victory over Cambridge.

With the Speciers trailing 3-1, Jeff Haines was hit by a pitch to lead off the inning. Two outs later, Terry Haines singled to keep the home town hopes alive.

Paul Mastalerz drew a base on balls to load the bases, and Dwayne Hatcher connected for an RBI single.

Fields became the hero

of the moment when he cleared the bases with a triple. Pitcher Terry Haines

was strong, striking out 12 while allowing just six hits. Cambridge third baseman Bob Okaeka touched Haines for a tworun homer in the eighth, that appeared to be the winning margin until the Specters rallied.

## Tax refunds en route
