## Mysticism course planned for library

A Georgetown man will be teaching a ten-week course entitled The Hidden Mysticism of the New Testament.

Paul Hourihan, Ph.D., received his academic training at Harvard and Boston University. For a quarter of a century his chief personal interest has been in meditation and mysticism and the spiritual realization the dedicated individual may attain.

Since 1975 Dr. Hourihan has taught adult education courses in mysticism and the hidden truths in world scriptures at the University of Guelph and other universities.

He has also conducted a private meditation study group which now meets with him weekly in Georgetown.

The Halton Hills Library and Cultural Centre will host the ten-week course starting Tuesday Sept. 20. Registration fee is \$25.
