Georgetown racers perform well

**Leathertown hosts races**

Georgetown motocross racer Tim Murdoch won his qualifying heat, then went on to finish sixth overall among 79 competitors in the 125 Junior at the Leathertown Cycle races in Acton on Sunday. Murdoch, 16, was one of four Leathertown racers who enjoyed some success at the meet, in which their sponsor hosted 215 riders from around the province. Sixteen-year-old Hank Hamilton also qualified for the 125 Junior final, but he experienced some mechanical problems, and finished well back.

Leathertown riders Dean Irvine, 14, and 15-year-old Brian Doherty advanced from a field of 21 to the 80 'A' class final. Irvine finished seventh overall in the 20 lap moto, while Doherty did not finish.

Two other Georgetown riders, 15-year-old Barry Yerxa and Dave Reynolds, also 15, competed in the 100cc 'Scholboy' class. Yerxa managed to finish fourth overall, while Reynolds was eighth. Georgetown's Matt Finucan was eighth in the 50 Open-Senior final. Finucan's younger brother, Brad, competed in the 125 Junior category.

**Greeks come from behind to keep perfect record intact**

Much to the dismay of a sellout crowd of Smoke Shop fans the big bad Greeks scored a come-from-behind 36-24 win over Delrex this week and for the second game in a row defeated a team that figures to provide their major competition. The Greeks now enjoy the only perfect record in the league.

Meanwhile Dairy Queen got back on track busting Corrigan Instrumentation 35-6. Independent Appraisal squashed T and R Paving 30-12. North Halton Sports sneaked past Lindsay's Longhorns 14-10 and, 10 and behold, M and M Pro Sports beat Fobert 19-14.

A tipped ball interception by Mike Mlehm on the Greek two yard line prevented Delrex from adding to their 16-14 lead on the final series of the first half. Another big defensive stand on the initial series in the second half swung the momentum in the Greeks' favor Sunday. Delrex had dominated the early going but after trading touchdowns for three quarters the Greeks put them away with 14 straight fourth-quarter points.

Mark Russell scored two touchdowns for the Greeks while Paul Wilson, J.T. Baldwin and Rob Rivers counted one each. Baldwin, John Karolidis and Linus Stauslis each scored two-point conversions.

For Delrex it was Werner Mikoleit, Jack Butler and Jerry Neil with majors and Neil, Butler and Terry Diardichuk with two-pointers. Bruce Cartwright picked off Delrex's only interception.

From their humble roots as a team called the Wimps two years ago M and M have gone steadily downhill this year. Sunday however, they looked a lot like a football team as they roared out to a 13-0 lead in the first quarter before suffering a relapse. They had to battle the rest of the way to preserve only their third win of the year.

Dave "Thrill" Robertson and John Clark hauled in TD strikes from import quarterback John Owen before the game was 10 minutes old. Clark set up his own TD with an interception.

Foberts got back in the game when Brian Tilson's interception led to a major by Bruce Urch.

That took care of the scoring until a fourth quarter flurry that saw Clark and Rich Ostofe trade TDs, but just when Foberts seemed to be coming on Doug Colter put out the fire with another M and M interception.

The Queens obviously suffered no lasting side effects from their first loss of the season as they came back this week and easily cuffed around Corrigan.

Howie Hulme and Stu Lunn each scored twice and Paul Egerton once. Jeff Lockwood was a standout on defense with two interceptions.

Brad Ferguson had the lone Corrigan score and Kevin Harrison briefly stemmed the tide with an interception.

**Harnois on to Nationals after smashing records**

Georgetown's Kim Harnois rewrote the record book in three swimming events at the Ontario Games for the Physically Disabled in Brampton on the weekend.

Harnois, 17, of Park Avenue, smashed the Canadian standards in the 100 and 200 meter freestyle events and the 100 meter backstroke.

She also competed in the shot put, but her final results were not available for press time.

The Halton Hills Blue Fin swimmers' performance at the Games was nothing short of spectacular. She shaved an amazing 13 seconds off her personal best time of two minutes and 15 seconds setting the record in the 100 meter freestyle event.

Her record time of 4:49:00 in the 200 meter distance was 19 seconds better than her best previous performance.

"When I got my time in the 100 freestyle, I couldn't believe it," Harnois said Monday. "I checked three different watches before I believed it."

Now that the excitement of the moment has subsided, Harnois has set her sights on eclipsing even more time from the Canadian mark. She plans to set new standards when she swims for the Ontario team in Sudbury at the National Games.

"If I train properly, I think I can go quite a bit faster," she said.

The Canadian Games are scheduled for Aug. 12. There, Harnois could qualify for the team that will represent Canada in Sweden at the World finals in October.
