Salmon hunt on again

The annual Toronto Star Great Salmon Hunt is worth \$1.25 million dollars this year, \$250,000 of this is definite, the rest is, as last year, a big maybe.

The chances of catching one particular fish of many thousands is not such an impossible feat as you may imagine. The tagged fish was caught last year, albeit after the contest was over. But that could change this year, and the chance at the big money is good.

The date of the salmon hunt are August 13 to September 25 with the \$1 million available for two days this year. These days are Sept. 17 and 18. If not taken on those two days, but before Sept. 25, the fish will be worth \$25,000. This COHO SALMON will be the most sought after fish in the world.

The heaviest COHO taken during the six-week contest will earn a \$50,000 grand prize.

Anyone entering an eligible fish has a chance at the grand draw prize worth almost as much as the grand prize. Minimum weight for entry is five pounds, and it would be foolish to fish Lake Ontario during that time without a derby ticket.

Weekly events offer over 400 prizes, valued from \$1,000 to \$5,000. A weekly draw prize is worth \$1,100 and registrations will be available in early August at Canadian Tire stores and Collegiate sports.

Another contest with much sought after honor is the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters annual big fish contest. Don't fail to enter any fish that falls in an eligible category in this one.

The new catch and release category is exciting to see. Entry forms are available at sporting goods stores across Ontario.

The federation is, as always, on top of problems affecting our wildlife and the environment. Letters have been sent to all concerned about the huge and deadly SPANISH RIVER chemical spill. Action was immediate and the response looks promising.

Hunters are reminded that the deadline for antlerless deer hunt tags is July 29, by 5 p.m. Contact the nearest office of the Ministry of Natural Resources, for further information.

The 1983 controlled deer hunt for Cambridge district, which includes Georgetown, is November 7-10. Deadline for the return of lottery applications is Aug. 31 and the draw will be held during the week of Sept. 12.

The controlled hunt will not affect the regular archery season, running Oct. 17 to Nov. 6, and Nov. 11 to Dec. 11.
