The Georgetown Mustangs bantam girls soccer team hosted the Brampton Lions last week and came away with a 6-0 victory. Goal scorers for the Mustangs were Sarah Belshaw and Chris Harris, with two each, while Sandy Heaton and Connie Powers picked up singles.

The Mustangs' mid-field duo of Lisa Allen and Amy Powers controlled the flow of the game while getting strong support from defenders Julie Hubbert, Rhonda Merrill, Debbie Smart and Barb McIntyre. Kelly Roe and Chris Wilcox shared the shut-out in net, although they weren't tested much, they were equal to the task whenever they were called upon.

On the other end, the Brampton goalie kept the score much lower than it might have been, by constantly robbing Mustang forwards, Nancy Mustard and Annie Powers, who both

had strong games on the wing. The Mustangs now sport an 8-1 record with only one league game remaining before the playoffs.

**League and playoff schedules final  
Gems open against two contenders**

A play-off format and tentative schedule were arrived at finally at the monthly meeting of the Central Ontario Junior Hockey League, Wednesday, August 5.

The play-offs remain the same with eight teams making the first round. This is one reason the league would have welcomed a 10th team. A six-team first round play-off becomes an unbalanced schedule with teams getting byes into third rounds. A real run for top spot is still assured since the first place finisher not only takes home that prestige, but chooses his opposition from the bottom four play-off finishers. The second place team then chooses the third and then the fourth.

The All Star Tournament, normally held during the Christmas break, is on hold. Miracle Mart, the founder and sponsor of the tourney, has withdrawn its financial backing. The OHA is trying to find another corporation to take over.

The 1983-84 schedule matches the GEMS with

the heavyweight contenders immediately. We open at home Saturday, October 1, against Streetsville and follow with Burlington on Saturday, October 8. Note the move to Saturday evening from Sunday. Game time re-
