The Mustangs' midfield duo of Lisa Allen and Amy Powers controlled the flow of the game while getting strong support from defenders Julie Hulbert, Rhonda Merril, Debbie Smart and Barb McIntyre. Kelly Roe and Chris Wilcox shared the shut-out in net, although they weren't tested much, they were equal to the task whenever they were called upon.


A win and three tles in their previous four games, whilst always short-handed, show that the Chargers are poised, ready to make a charge for the Cup.
