Bike licence

Get your wheels licensed Saturday, Halton regional police are selling bicycle licences at the back of their Georgetown station Saturday from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. A town bylaw requires bikes to be licensed, otherwise bicyclists can be charged with a \$5 fine. Licences cost only \$2.

If you don't want to bring along your bike, do bring along the serial number of your bike, its color and make. Children whose bikes haven't a serial number are asked to bring their mom or dad's social. insurance number with them and police will engrave that number on their bike to help identify it in the case of theft.

Construction up by 2.6 million

Building increases for Halton Hills

Halton Hills' building picture continues to brighten as Canada's economy regains Its health.

New construction valued at \$5,841,366 has been completed or is underway so far this year - that's over \$2.6 million more than for the same January to June period last year.

For the first six months of 1981, construction permits were taken out for construction worth \$6.66

UPSWING '

There's a remarkable upswing in the number of new homes being built. Figures given to town council Monday night from the town's building department show that 42 new residential permits have been issued so far this year, for a total construction value of about \$4.4 million.

In 1982, only 11 permits for \$470,000 worth of construction were handed out in the first six months of

the year. More homeowners are making renovations this year as well, June was busy month for home improvements, as reflected in the number of building permits (117) lasued. Close to \$200,000 worth of renovations were approved in June representing about one-third of this year's total to date.

FARMINCREASE Farmers are also doing more building this year than in the last two years, the figures show. Construction worth \$398,640 has been approved, compared with \$231,200 and \$311,000 over the same six-month period in 1982 and 1981 respectively.

Commercial, institutional and government and industrial construction has dropped substantially

compared to the previous two years. ,

Only two industry-related building permits have been issued so far for \$58,000 of new construction. For the first six months of 1981, over \$1.2 million in new construction was approved and \$209,000 in 1982.

Compared to figures in the hundreds of thousands of dollars in 1981 and 1982, there is only \$79,570 on the books for the first six months of this year.


