Drop two extra-inning heartbreakers

Specters out of OASA

The Glen Williams Specters made a quick, albeit dramatic, exit from the Ontario Amateur Softball Association playoffs Wednesday night, dropping a 6-5, 11-inning decision to Dunnville.

The loss was the second heartbreaker in as many nights for the Specters, after they dropped a 2-0, 15-inning affair in the series opener Tuesday night at the Glen.

The Glen men made a good run at it Wednesday

night in Dunnville, charging back from a 3-1 deficit to take a 5-3 lead with a four-run outburst in the third inning. The home side came back with a pair in the fourth to tie it, though, and then won it in the eleventh.

The locals opened the scoring when Glen McClure opened the game with a single, moved up a base on an Andy Broadbent sacrifice, and scored on an error.

Dunnville catcher Marc

Plug crashed a two-run homer in the home half of the inning, however, to nullify the quick Glen start.

In the third, with the Specters trailing 3-1, third sacker Tim Fields drew a base on balls to lead off the inning. Back-to-back singles by McClure and Rob Hatcher, an error on a ball hit by Broadbent, and a double by Mike Reynolds produced three Specter runs.

In the opener on Tuesday night, pitcher Jeff Haines struck out 19 batters, allowing just eight hits over 15 innings, but he still took the loss. Dunnville hurler Frank Bird was equally as effective,

striking out 13 Glen batters, and limiting the home side to just four hits.

The Specters didn't have a baserunner until Broadbent doubled in the seventh. Terry Haines managed to be hit by a pitch in the ninth.

Dunnville center fielder Bob Vail broke the game open finally when he doubled to lead off the 15th, and Plug followed him with another two-base hit. Left fielder Rick Mowat uncorked a third consecutive double, and it was 2-0 for the visitors.

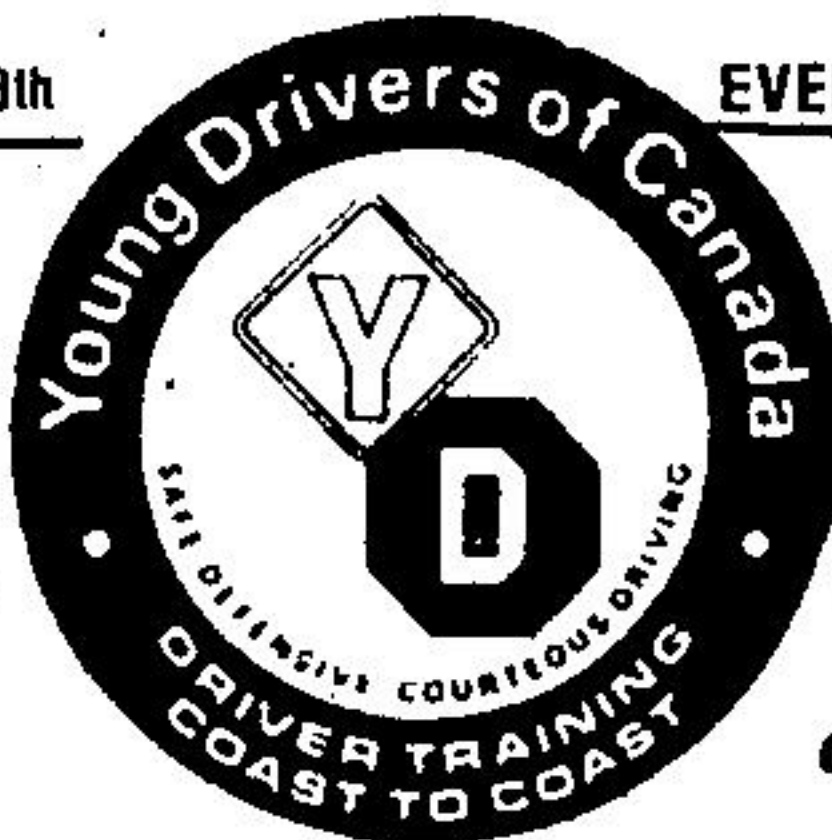
