Slow week on the lake

Last week was a little slow on Lake Ontario. The earlier salmon were fish over for a visit from the States, and are now on the way back.

The Canadian fish are just coming in and fishermen are starting to get into them at fair distances from shore. This is when a VHF radio comes in handy and is almost an essential to the fishing scene. The common CB radio is almost a thing of the past and most charter boat captains don't even bother to turn it on. Lots of individuals still tote them on their small fishing boats, but the "traffic" on the air is almost nil. If you do not have a radio, then your best chance is to get to know the names and descriptions of the best charter boats and follow them.

You will not be very popular with these boats and crew, but you will know where the fish are as these cap'tains are always on top of the fish. This is the reason why I recommend booking a charter to get into fish. If you follow a charter boat, then at least give them room and don't crowd them. Some use "side planers" or "yellow birds" which run out from the side of the boat. Remember that a fisherman is considered a sportsman, and act accordingly.

Now is the time to start using dodgers ahead of your lure. Up until this time most fish were taken on "clean" lures, that is not attracted ahead of the plug or spoon. The EPPINGER FLUTTER CHUCK by DAREDEVIL has been a very hot lure and is still considered one of the best to take chinook.

CHARTER FOR THE WEEK: George Salter runs SALTER TWO and he recently took 43 salmon and trout in 10 days. That tells something of the skills of this charter boat captain. George's 28-foot boat is equipped with all you need to make a day's charter a full day of excitement. He even has a fridge and stove on board as well as a washroom. George by the way was the winner of the salmon derby in 1979. Phone 416-827-4583.

Bob Derry runs a 21-foot Sunrunner and according to my friend, Captain Brian Donnelly, Lil' Dodger Charters is the way to go for salmon. As with all charter boats, book well in advance of the date you wish to fish as Bob is often booked. Georgetown trio anchor defence

How much success the Burlington Stampeders of the Ontario Junior Football League enjoy this fall will depend, to a large degree, on their Georgetown connection.

This season, the Stampeder defensive unit will be anchored by three former members of the Rebel football program at Georgetown District High School. Seventeen-year-old Paul Wilson and Mark Armstrong, 18, will line

up beside each other as half of the club's front four, while Falcon soccer star Ian MacIver, 17, has won a starting job on the corner in the backfield. The three were hand-picked for their positions by Stampeder head coach

Tony Bordinaro, who watched them hone their skills at an Etobicoke football clinic last year. He put the boys on individual conditioning programs commencing in mid-May, and told them to report to camp in shape in August.

MacIver, who won a trophy as best DB at the Etobicoke clinic, was dismayed upon arriving at camp to find he was probably the smallest candidate, at 5'10" and 150 lbs.

The improvement was due to the return of some players from vacation and greater determination in all areas.

Sandy Jobin-Bevans and Bob Donker settled to their task, so that Chad Bailey was able to concentrate on setting problems for the visiting defenders. The Georgetown team attacked with rapid strikes, whereas Erin Mills was more ponderous in its buildup.

After 30 minutes, the home team scored a goal that rewarded the tenacity of the captain.

Mike Melvillo darted from midfield and dribbled with skill into the visitors' penalty area, where he appeared to have been overwhelmed by the number of defenders. However, he picked himself up after a shattering tackle and drove a hard shot at the net. The Erin Mills goalkeeper could only parry the drive and Darren Gray was in position to thump home

the equalizer from the rebound. The second half began much as the first, highlighted by spectacular goalkeeping from Nicky Varrichio, who even saved a penalty kick. The visitors became increasingly frustrated as their efforts were thwarted by the perpetual harrying of Jimmy English in midfield and the aggressive hustle of Mike Hughes on the right wing. A tie would have been a just result, but this was not to be as, five minutes from time, a shot by an Erin Mills forward just crept in under the top corner of the net.

The pattern of the game was evident early as the visitors drove forward. However, the defensive line of Steve Alchin, Derek Woolgar and Rich Sowery remained resolute and repulsed all attacks.
