

Longhorns hand red-hot Greeks first loss

Get the women and children off the streets, here come the Longhorns.

There weren't very many tears shed this week when the big bad Greeks choked on a chance to become the first team since the Smoke Shop to go through a Georgetown Flag Football league season undefeated and were blown out by the

red-hot Longhorns 42-28. As a result the Longhorns, who were dead and buried a week ago, have surged into the playoffs dropping IAS out of the picture and establishing themselves as a team to be reckoned with in the East division.

Elsewhere, Foberts crushed the slumping Queens 48-6, and M and M Sports upset AS 39-22, handing them a loss that cost them a playoff berth.

North Halton shutout T and R Paving 39-0, and Smoke Shop stole one from Corrigan, 34-33 on the last play of the game.

Behind a superb man-to-man defense Lindsay's Longhorns stunned the Greeks, who were a little premature patting themselves on the back over their undefeated season.

Jim Lindsay picked off a Greek pass early to set up the first Longhorn

score and that was all she wrote. The blue meanies got close a couple of times, but nothing serious was allowed to develop by the swarming Longhorns.

Bill Allison scored twice, Rob and Paul Allison once, and Mike McCandless once for the Longhorns. Jim Lindsay added six extra points for a perfect day on point-after attempts.

James Allen, Rob Rivers, Dan Reynolds and Wayne Straulis scored Greek TD's with John Larose adding a two-point conversion. Mike Michm gave the Greeks defense something to crow about briefly with his 10th interception of the year in the second quarter.

How the mighty have fallen. The Dairy Queen squad, now going through the moltons, bears no resemblance at all to the guys who won five straight to start the year.

Their effort this week was as flimsy as a Soviet excuse, as Foberts shut them down with laughable ease.

Rick Donaldson scored twice and Dave McCarthy, Bruce Urch, Ken Baker and Rob Arthurs once each. Terry Hunt converted four and added two field goals and an interception.

Keith Peacock, Arthurs and Brian Tilson also picked off DQ passes.

Bob Dean hit Bob Lockwood and Jeff Chisholm with two fourth quarter TD strikes to send M and M into the playoffs on a winning note.

For IAS, a team of seemingly infinite promise when the season began it was a complete shock to suddenly find themselves out in the cold.

As he has done so often in the past, Lockwood led M and M with a pair of interceptions, three touchdowns, a two-point conversion and two singles. It hasn't been a vintage Lockwood season, but when he takes the game in his own hands as he did this week it spells trouble for the other side.

The team traded first half TD's, but M and M outscored them by a 24-8 margin in the second half.

Jim Taggart scored two majors for IAS and Bryan Myers once. Rob McKelvey and Bill Davis each had a two-point convert and Davis grabbed an interception.

Joe Wygergangs scored the other M and M TD, and Ken Lockwood kicked a field goal and two converts. "Scoop" Scallen and Doug Colter had interceptions.

Every season you hear how old the Smoke Shop is and how easy they're going to be to beat, but every year they end up at or near the top proving more games are won on the field than the sidelines.

Corrigan played the Smokers to a stand off this week, but elected to go for the tie rather than the throat when Bob Bushell's touchdown got them to within one in the last minute.

On the final play of the game, Doug Thompson pounded a 58-yard field

goal attempt wide into the Corrigan end zone where a spectacular tackle by Steve Frost gave Delrex a single and the win.

Thompson did a bit of everything, throwing a 40-yard strike that Terry Diarchichuk hauled in with a circus catch, stole an interception and generally dominated when he was on the field.

Brad Ferguson was the major thorn in the Smoker's side as he scored twice and made a dozen key catches.

Rick Larose and Joe Domingoes also scored for CI while Randy Geger, Werner Mikoleit and Chris Sargent had the other Delrex TD's. John Vierra, Geger and Diarchichuk caught two-point conversions.

North Halton had the final kick at the T and R Paving corpse this year and rolled up their big-

gest win over. Bill Fournier, Mike Buck, Greg Lawr and Ron Wodhams handled the majors while Kevin Brown picked up two

interceptions. Steve News was the only Paver to get his name on the game sheet with an interception. Playoffs start next

week with DQ vs Foberts at 8:45, Smoke Shop vs M and M at 10:00, Greeks vs Longhorns at 11:15 and Corrigan vs North Halton at 12:30.
