lonals they work with, Region approves St. Elizabeth's bid to serve Halton



Over the last several months, another nonprofit visiting nurses organization, the Victorian Order of Nurses, has strongly opposed St. Elizabeth's bid to expand its operations from the Hamilton area into the region.

The VON is concerned that a competing service will cut into the demand for its nursing care, forcing cutbacks in personnel and possibly service. As the traditional visiting nurses agency in Halton, the VON had plenty of support from regional councillors during last Wednesday's council meeting.

Council split 12-12 when a recorded vote was called on the issue, with Mr. Raftle siding in favor of St. Elizabeth's
