

# Gala parade gives Acton fall fair lots of extra 'oom-pah'

Who doesn't get all excited when they hear the drums going "boom boom" and see the flashy costumes of bands marching by?

The Acton Fall Fair won't be missing any of the flavor of a real parade Sept. 17.

Already, parade organizer Bob Johnston has lined up seven marching bands to take part.

Following tradition, they'll all be led by the Acton Citizens Band along the three kilometres walk from MacKenzie Smith Middle School to the fairgrounds at Prospect Park.

With them will be a number of floats by local merchants, service clubs and other community groups.

"In most cases, we don't know until 11 and 12 o'clock who's going to take part," Mr. Johnston said. "A common problem is getting a group of people together to put on a float."

The noon hour parade celebrates the fair's 70th anniversary with a look at the Acton area's agricultural heritage.

Among the groups taking part are the Brampton Shriners with their Go Cart patrol. The Acton Legion Branch 197 is bringing in the Hamilton firefighters

brass band.

Other bands include the Ajax Sea Cadet Band, the Arthur District High School Marching Band, the Canadiana Accordion Band and Majorettes from Scarborough, the Georgetown Girls Pipe Band, and the Merchants' Marching Band put together by the Acton Business Improvement Association.

Trailing one behind the other, these bands and floats will cross the railway tracks, down Mill Street through the town, turn right at Main Street, then turn left at Knox Presbyterian Church into Prospect Park.

Once again, there are prizes being offered for the best looking floats following the fair theme. First prize wins

\$75, second prize \$50 and third prize, \$30.

Politicians MPP Julian Reed, MP Otto Jellenek and Mayor Pete Pomeroy will be part of the parade, as well as Acton Citizen of the Year Ted Tyler.

The Acton fair beauty queens of the past 20 years have been invited to attend, and at least 12 of them have promised to show up and take part in the Saturday parade.

"We're hoping for no rain, and no train coming through," Mr. John-

ston said. Every year the committee arranges the time with CN so the

parade doesn't get caught on either side of the tracks near Bower

Avenue. The parade budget is \$1,500 this year.

The candidate areas that have been identified as potential landfilling areas are outlined on the accompanying map.

Residents of Halton that are interested in reviewing and commenting on the process used to identify these areas are invited to attend an Information Centre with the consultants and Region of Halton staff.

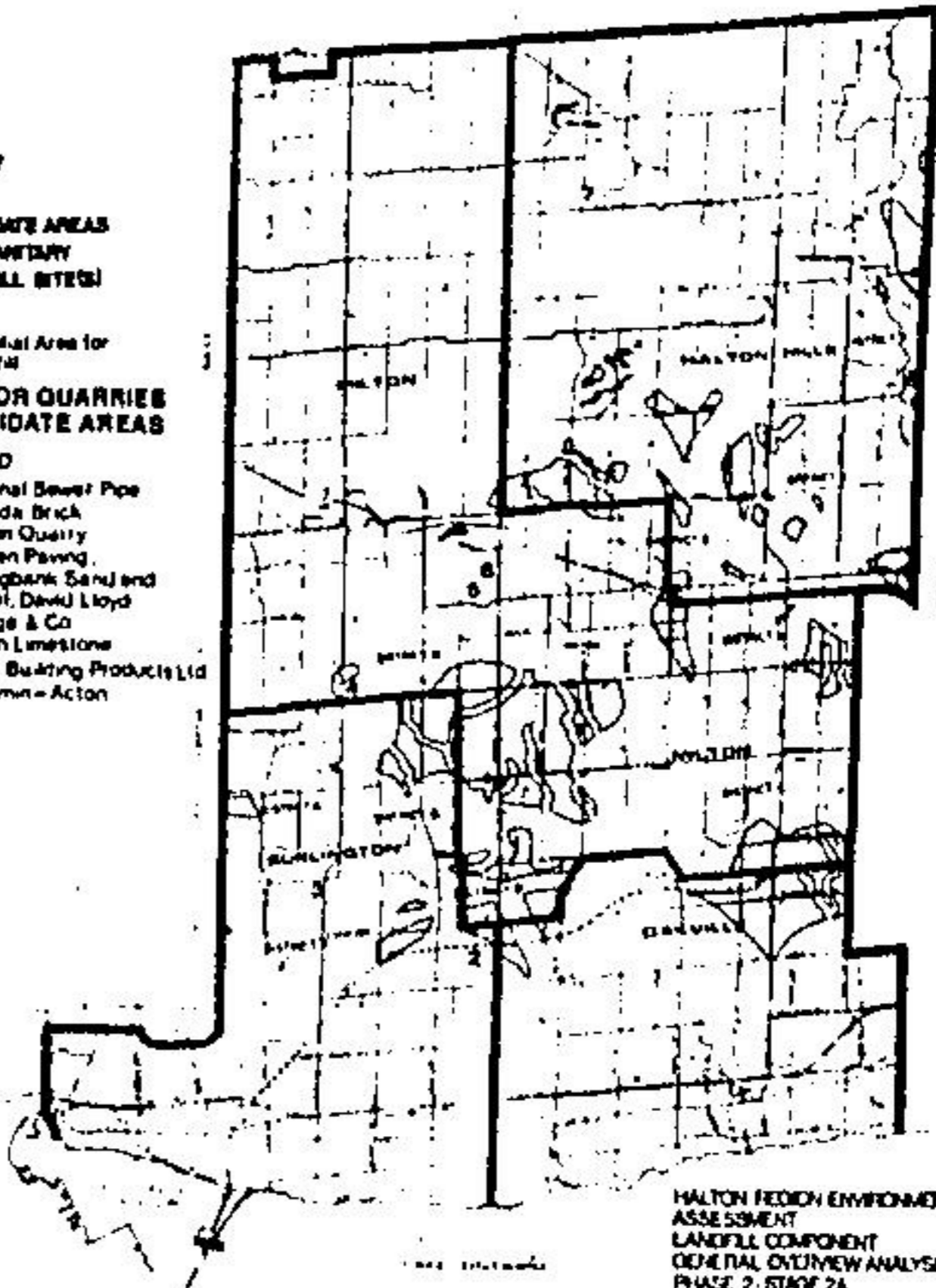
