Sheldon concerned over short list

Landfill possibility in Acton area, study suggests

As the region's environmental assessment study begins to narrow down possible sites for a new landfill site, Coun. Pam Sheldon is concer-

ned that an Acton location has ended up on the study's short list.

Last Tuesday the region held a special public meeting in Oakville to review its site selection process and discuss what the next step will be as it tries to find a new landfill site for Halton's trash.

The Indusmin property south of Acton near the Highway 25 - Regional Road 43 intersection is one of seven sites which regional consultants feel could be used as a landfill site.

While urging councillors to stay informed of
the environmental process now underway,
town engineer Bob Austin suggested that it
would be "premature"
for council to officially
react to the Indusmin
land showing up on the
region's list of candidate landfill sites.

The property is used for quarrying lime-

stone.

He told council Monday night that the work consultants are doing will leave room for municipal responses to the landfill site search.

Town officials indicated, that because of the broad scope of the environmental study that the region is not ready to commit itself to a location yet.

The environmental assessment for the landfill site search is being held in conjunction with another internal study on how most of the region's trash can be recycled and turned into fuel

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
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
