Stu Lunn and Brian Davis counted DQ majors in the first half. Howie Hulme added a two-point convert and set up Lunn's TD with an interception.

The championship game goes this Sunday at 11 a.m. M and M have already gone south to film a Lite beer commercial, and should be well primed by Sunday.
