Gemini lose number 6

The jury is still out on the Georgetown Junior 'B' Gemini, but they're coming back in this week, and they'll be handing down a decision soon.

The Gems split a pair of Central Ontario Hockey League games on the weekend, leaving them with a pair of wins in eight outings, and mired in eighth place in the nine-team loop.

On the weekend they thrashed Acton, 9-3, before returning home to Gordon Alcott Arena Saturday night to lose to the very unimpressive Barrie Colts, 4-1.

This is the situation now. The Gems will

have a full line-up on hand for each of their four starts this week. They are not dead yet, but they are in intensive care. What they accomplish this week, against Streetsville, Barrie, Oakville and Thornhill, should be an accurate preview of the duration of the schedule.

Saturday night, the Gems were missing only two players from the regular line-up, Lance Doucette (suspension) and Riv Kennedy (injury). The problem, however, is that those two are the club's top centers, and they were counted on to do much of

the club's scoring this year. The result was that while the Gems dominated the play territorially, and even outshot their guests (24-20), they couldn't mount many serious scoring threats.

Returning veteran

Mark Hamilton found the range for the lone Gem goal, from Terry West and Bill Bathgate. That was at 13:08 of the final period, after Barrie had built a 4-0 lead and were coasting to victory.

The Barrie goals, meanwhile, were

nothing to write home about. The two first-period markers were both of the 'soft' variety, scored on an unsteady Rob-Larocque. The final two Barrie goals, against veteran Wayne Cowley, were the direct result of glaring Gemini errors.
