In fact, last year 40,000 young children died, not as a result of war or natural disaster, but because of the combination of malnutrition and preventable infection. For every child that died, six more live on, hungry and sick.

This is a "silent emergency". It does not make headlines, but the lack of food and clean drinking water, inadequate medical care and the unavailability of social services together constitute the greatest threat to the survival of

over one billion children.

In 1982, over 5 million children and their mothers benefitted from donations made to UNICEF Canada. The lives of hundreds of thousands of children were saved and their futures were made brighter than they would otherwise have been. Each dollar provided to projects in developing countries by UNICEF is matched by CIDA (Canadian International Development Agency), and this total is then matched again by the country being assisted

in goods and services.
