Because shop owners can't sit down and watch every movie that comes into their store, they depend on distributors to do the cutting that complies with federal law, Mrs. Patcheson said.

"If I had to sit down and watch every movie that came into my store, I'd be cross eyed," she said. "You just couldn't possibly keep up with it. You trust the distributors as they're making them for distribution."

Leery of putting out questionable films, some distributors cut down on their supply over the summer, Mrs. Patcheson noted. And some cassettes came with the OCB sticker on it, indicating they had been approved.

"We've been careful in what we've been buying and I feel we've done as much as we could, with the information we've had, to comply with the guidelines," she said.

Randy Humenicki, co-owner of the Acton and Georgetown H and H Video shops refused to comment on whether he thinks the OCB should censor video films.

The Lung Association will launch its major campaign Nov. 1st with this year's goal of \$3.5 million. The Christmas Seal campaign target for the Halton Lung Association is \$130,000.

"I am confident that the people of Halton will respond to the Christmas Seal mailing. We need the generous support of all to reach our goal so that it will not be necessary to cutback on our programs," says Cec McFadden, (Fund-raising chairman.)

Christmas seals will be mailed to more than 92,000 households and corporations in the Halton area.

One in every five Canadians suffer from a breathing problem, ranging from asthma, chronic bronchitis, emphysema and tuberculosis, to pneumonia, farmer's lung and lung cancer.
