

Annual football meeting to appoint new executive

With another highly-successful season under its belt, the Georgetown Flag Football League held its annual meeting last week. Of primary importance on the agenda was the election of new officers for the league executive.

Martin Hardcastle, stepping down after three distinguished years as president, passed the reins of power into the capable hands of Jim Lindsay. Well-known throughout the league and a top notch receiver and corn-roast organizer, Lindsay is a fine choice for the presidency.

Backing up Lindsay will be Doug Pemberton as vice-president. It seems appropriate that one of the most prominent and supportive flag football families has one of their number on the executive.

The unsung heroes of the executive, David McCarthy as secretary and Steve Harris as treasurer will remain in those positions, contributing valuable experience for 1984.

The arduous job of statistician will be shared by Ron Woodhams and Paul Larose next year.

It will take two people to fill the enormous pair of shoes left behind by

departing press relations officer, Tim Tolton. Tolton has retired to a rest home in Fort Lauderdale. Don Scallen and Paul Wilson will assume his former duties.

Martin Hardcastle will still be involved in the operation of the league in 1984, but in the less-demanding position of social director.

He will be assisted by George Pemberton in this task. George will also remain in the post of head referee. It is hoped that these responsibilities do not prevent George from fulfilling his other important responsibility - cooking the famous "Wimpey" burgers.

Other business conducted at the league meeting included commissioning Chris Sargent to examine league rules and propose amendments and additions to those rules. Suggested revisions to the league by-laws, which have not been updated since 1980, will be submitted to the executive by Rob Hamilton and Wayne Doyle.

Apart from the selection of the 1984 executive, a proposal was discussed that would see the establishment of a league all-star team for 1984. With representation from each team in the G.F.F.L., the all-star team would compete in the Guelph touch football league.

Of immediate interest is the November 6th game in Guelph between a group of GFFL selects and a top Guelph touch team. The Guelph team, ranked 10th in the province, challenged the GFFL to a contest after learning of the success of the Georgetown entry in the Burlington touch football tournament on Labour Day. The game promises to be a barn burner. A bus has been rented and will leave Georgetown high school at 12:30 on game day. Anyone interested in attending the game should be at the school at noon. Bus fare will cost \$2. A large turnout is hoped for, to cheer Georgetown on to victory.

The GFFL membership of close to 200 players, though now suffering from post-football let down can rest assured that the league's eighth season in 1984 will be another banner year.

At a meeting of the Georgetown Youth Soccer Club coaches and managers last week, a wide range of topics were discussed, pertaining to problems encountered during the 1983 season, and possible solutions.

The discussions ranged from facilities to trophies and playoffs

to coaching clinics. Many excellent suggestions on these topics were received from the floor, and will form the basis of the executive's actions for next season.

It became very evident during the discussions however, that most of the problems stem from lack of volunteers on the administrative side of the club. During 1983, only half of the

positions on the Board of Directors had been filled, and with approximately 1000 players involved in soccer, smooth operation of the club became impossible.

The same situation, to a lesser degree, existed with coaches, managers and commissioners. Some teams started the season without a coach. Lengthy discussions

on how to generate more interest amongst adults in youth soccer took place. Again many ideas were forthcoming

including the possibilities of limited registration, and free registration for the children of volunteers. However, these

ideas, will have to be evaluated by the new executive, and that is the first problem to be

faced by the club.

On Sunday, Nov. 13 at 10 a.m. at Cedarvale Park, the club's annual general meeting will be held, at which a new executive committee must be elected. Club President Klaus Zander will be standing for re-election, but the positions of secretary and treasurer have been vacated. Nominations are

required for all of these positions in addition to all positions on the board of directors. Information on any of these positions can be obtained from Club Secretary, Gary Spiller at 877-8777. The meeting closed with the registration of 15 coaches for next season, about 20 per cent of our projected requirement.
