'Show respect for veterans'

Clarence Wood made a very emotional speech at the Georgetown Royal Canadian Legion Branch 130 Saturday evening.

The night opened with a dinner and then various short speeches were made about Remembrance Day and the Legion's commitment to it. The master of ceremonies was Reverend Peter Barrow. Before the speeches Julie Blanch played the "Last Post for Henry Valley" on her bugle.

Mr. Wood is presently retired and lives in Don Mills. Throughout his life he has served in various volunteer programs which include being president of the Lions Club. He served in World War II for three and a half years.

In his speech he stresses that we should show respect for those who made our country what it is today.

He points out that many young people do not realize what it means to die in war and we should respect the veterans' sacrifice more than ever.

Considering the instability of other nations we are always plagued with the possibility of another war, he said.

Mr. Wood talked about the Legion in relation to the war. He says the Legion is the most exclusive club in Canada because you have to be a soldier to gain membership.

Also, only a third of the people who would have belonged to the Legion are here now. The other two thirds are buried overseas.
