Hornets sting **GM** Kentner

Dave Kentner, the man who pulls the strings for the Georgetown Raiders, is making no bones about it. His charges were whipped every which way imaginable last Sunday in Cambridge.

In case you missed it, the Ralders took a lesson from the finest amateur hockey club this side of Moscow, to the tune of 9-3. Kentner admits he became concerned when the defending Allan Cup champs pinned the Georgetown crew in their own end of the rink for the first five minutes of the match.

To sum it up, the Cambridge team accomplished just what they had in mind. They slapped the collective faces of those upstarts from Georgetown. They beat the Raiders on the ice, in the dressing room, and at the executive level. That's what is most painful for Kentner to admit.

Since Black Sunday, Kentner has spent considerable time reassuring the Raider faithful that some of the wheels are still on the wagon. The rest of the time has been spent onthe phone, recruiting players to fill the eight Raider cards and five affiliate cards he has left. More than 50 such calls, he estimates, and a nifty \$700 tab from Ma Bell.

The problem, as the GM sees it, is that the Raiders haven't risen to the challenge of Senior 'A' hockey. Many of the players can't or won't make the personal committment necessary, such as showing up for both weekly practices. Some of them are just plain out of shape.

Kentner realizes he has only himself to blame for the current crisis. He permitted a philosophy to be carried over from the old days, when the Raiders were the kings of the Intermediate hockey hill, that just doesn't cut it at this level.

Historically, the Raiders get down to brass tacks after Christmas. They sign players in October that are unavailable for duty until the new year. They airlift in replacements to strengthen a weak defence, or bolster a puny attack.

"We've been forced to reconsider for next year, our present philosophy of expecting less than a total committment until Christmas," Kentner said. "We have changed our standards. As it is, we can't allow another month to go by for our players to get in shape. Cambridge has shown us how wide the gap really is."

Every dark cloud has a sliver lining, however, and if ever a man could find something beneficial in a 9-3 whipping, it is Kentner.

"Something magical happened on Sunday," Kentner said. "Saunders, Twiss, Gibb, Juri...you could see it. They have the eye of the tiger again." All you Rocky Balboa fans know what he's

alluding to. The Raider organization is not accustomed to failure. The players are winners, and they have been humiltated. More importantly, coach Gerry Inglis is humiliated. And angry.

In a nutshell, that means play-time is over, and the big boys are ready to get down to business. That's the business of beating the Cambridge Hornets, February 17 in Cambridge. The two clubs close out the regular schedule here a week later.

"This is fantastic, what it's all about,". Kentner said, expanding on his silver-lining theme. "I'll actually get to be a GM this year. I'm going to make a contribution." Translated, that means the airlift is already

underway. New players will be on the scene shortly. Old ones that won't or can't devote themselves to the Raider cause will be ushered out. It won't stop until February 10, when the league asks for final rosters.

"We were rolling along on our laurels, but now Cambridge has awakened the sleeping giant," Kentner said. "But It won't change overnight."

It doesn't have to. You've got until February, Dave.
