A good passing team effort enabled the Georgetown minor peewee "AA" Optimists to trounce the Burlington Maaco Reps 6-2 at Memorial Arena last week.

Burlington took a 1-0 lead late in the first period on a power play. Midway through the second stanza Bill MacDonald tied the game after an end-to-end rush set up by David Hodgson and Wes McCauley. The locals turned on the power scoring three goals in a two-minute time span, the first of

which was tucked away by MacDonald knocking in a rebound from McCauley and Wade Serjantson. At 1:43 Mike Barnes scored with a nice wrist shot on a beautiful pass from Mark Lorito. With 54 seconds remaining, Andy Pearce beat the Burlington blocker with a nice backhand on a last-minute deke again after an end-to-end rush. Defenceman Rod Pasma and winger Dale McNiven set up this play.

Burlington scored another power play goal early in the third frame but it was their last of the night. McCauley

counted again for Georgetown with assists earned by Pasma and Hodgson. Mike Barnes counted the sixth Georgetown goal at the 8:55 mark on a perfect goal mouth pass from Lorito, beating the goalie on the side with a quick, surprising wrist shot.

Chris Cambouris handled nine shots for the Optimists compared to 25 against the opposition.

Coach Paul Morrow was pleased with the passing plays initiated in this game by all three lines. Travelling to St.

Thomas, on the weekend, the Optimist "AA" minor peewees participated in the "Early Bird" Tournament at the Elgin Memorial Centre playing only their two guaranteed games.

Game one pitted the locals against Stoney Creek where they easily won 5-0. Richard Rivard was awarded a shut-out plaque for his effort in this game. At 6:45 in the first frame Lorito tucked away a Gretzky-type goal from behind the net assisted by McCauley and Hodgson.

MacDonald scored the first goal in the second frame on an unassisted effort while Georgetown was short-handed. At the 3:39 mark Mike Melville put away a slider right under a prostrate Creek goalie, assisted by Chad Bailey. Pasma scored next on a slapshot from the blue line from Lorito.

Midway through the final period Lorito tallied goal number five for the locals when he made a series of dekes through the Creek defence assisted by defenceman Mike McElroy and winger McNiven.

Coach Nick Katsos complimented the defensive unit on their exceptional puck control, lateral passing and pulling back the rubber, adding that the entire Georgetown unit was emotionally in control of this game as well.

Match two saw Georgetown defeated by Streetsville in sudden death overtime 3-2. Streetsville counted late in the first frame to go ahead 1-0.

At 8:44 of the second period Pasma tied the game on a beautiful slapshot from the blue line assisted by Lorito.

Lorito put the locals ahead 2-1 at the 4:09 mark on a nice backhand after deking the netminder. McCauley earned the assist on this effort.

With only 35 seconds left in the game Streetsville tied it up to force five minutes of sudden death overtime.

Fifty seconds into the overtime Streetsville notched the game winner to eliminate Georgetown 3-2, leaving coaches, players and fans in a state of complete shock.
