

Smoking Statistics

In 1979 in the 25 to 44 age group, 40 per cent of the population in that age group smoked cigarettes regularly. The proportion of the total population age 25 to 44 that smoked between one and ten cigarettes was 5.3 per cent, between 11 and 25 cigarettes 28.7 per cent, and over 25 cigarettes 5.8 per cent.

Eighteen per cent of Canadian adults smoked low tar yield cigarettes in 1981. About 21 per cent of Ontarians used low tar cigarettes.

The tendency to smoke low tar yield cigarettes is directly related to education. Approximately 18 per cent of regular smokers smoke low tar yield cigarettes. Only 14 per cent of respondents with 0 to 5 years education smoke low tar yield cigarettes compared to 32 per cent of university educated respondent.

Approximately 80 per cent of regular smokers started smoking before age 20.

Approximately 48 per cent of Canadian males and 39 per cent of females have been exposed to the risks of smoking for 20 years or more.
