



It added that the site is close to the Georgetown urban area, on good provincial and regional road arteries and near enough to municipal water suppliso that private wells may not be needed.

CHANGE PLAN? Halton Hills should reconsider its designation of rural industrial land in its official plan, the report recommends.

The town is considering land south of Steeles and north of Highway 401 and land north of Regional Road 9 along Highway 25 as possible industrial land sites for the rural area.

Both areas, the study adds, have disadvantages because they lie on prime agricultural land, although they scored high for accessibility. The report commented that the Highway 25 land would be hard to market because of the expense of dry industriai land available in Milton's 401 industrial park to the south.

There is "dry" industrial land already in Acton, but the study doubts that it can "satisfy the locational demands of the rural market in Halton Hills."




