In the novice competition, Barber's best hope lies with the team of Melanie Cole and Donald Godfrey, the Eastern Canadian champs. Barber, who has been coaching for two years now since he retired from competitive skating, says his good relationship with Bradshaw

instruct. "It's his experience and my new ideas." Barber told The Herald. "Ray and I have a free hand in coaching these teams, and our ideas seem to be working."
