U of Waterloo offer credit courses

The University of Water-
loo will offer two
courses in Halton Hills
this winter. Classes will
begin the week of Jan. 9.
The courses may be
attended free of charge
for personal interest or
may be taken for univer-
sity credit. Registration
(for credit students)
will take place at the
first three class meet-
ings.
Prof. Bob Lahue, Ren-
ison college, will con-
duct a class in the Acton
public library Tuesday
evenings. His course,
Values in the Social
Sciences, will examine
how and to what extent
professional and societ-
al values influence the
decisions and activities
of those involved in the
social sciences.
At Holy Cross separ-
ate school, Georgetown,
Allan Bross will discuss
the social work profes-
sion - its historical devel-
opment, disciplines, va-
lues, theories and meth-
odologies.
The course, Introduct-

ion to Social Work, will
be relevant for people
who have a general
interest in social work
and for those consider-
ing entering the profes-
sion.
"Social work is being
carried out in various
organizations and agen-
cies. We will be discuss-
ing current theories and
using case studies. Can-
adian social policies and
planning, and their im-
pact will be highlight-
ed," explains Allan.
Classes will meet Wed-
nesdays, 7 to 10 p.m.
Both courses may be
taken for credit towards
a B.A. degree as well as
for credit toward the
certificates offered by
Renison college.
Further information

or from UW's office of
part-time studies and
continuing education
