

Sabres split

The Acton Jr. 'B' hockey Sabres split their weekend games with a 6-5 road victory over Milton Friday and a 3-1 loss to Oakville at home Saturday.

After losing a heart-breaker to Thornhill 6-6 the previous Monday, the Sabres came back to put in a stellar performance against the Milton Steamers.

Roy Spears, a defenseman freshly acquired from the Georgetown Gemini, had an exceptional game against the Mustangs. He set up the tying goal and scored the winner.

But against the Oakville Blades, a team that ranks second in the Central Ontario Jr. 'B' league, the Sabres' hard work and hustle weren't enough to earn them two points. What they really needed was a rabbit's foot.

Ron Hoover converted on a pass from Lane Bauldry and Chris Norton on the Blade power-play.

The lone Sabre goal was a pretty one and it came with nine minutes left in the game while the team was shorthanded.

Ken Kavanagh stole the puck from the face-off circle in the Oakville end which beat Kitto cleanly.

Acton outshot Oakville 19-11 in the third period, but good goaltending from Kitto and Sabre luck, which was all bad, prevented them

from scoring more than once.

A fair-sized crowd attended the game, and Buchanan said he was pleased to see the people of Acton coming out to support the team.

The team's play has improved since Buchanan took over from Gary Hudson last month. The players are starting to work harder, he said, and he's getting them into shape.

In addition to a two-hour practice weekly the players have been doing a series of heart and lung exercises, circuit training, and some running.

Acton Knights bounce Sports Hollywood moves into first

In a strange turn of events, the previously winless Acton Sitting Bull Tavern Knights bounced the league-leading M and M Pro Sports, 6-7, as play resumed this week in the Georgetown Industrial Hockey League.

Bob Baker started the Knights off on the right foot with a goal at the 9:33 mark of the opening period. After Terry Moustard and Roger Chapman had connected to put the sports in front, 2-1, Baker set up Mike Murray for Acton's second goal.

A late first-period goal by Mike Michm

and an Andy Broad-bent marker less than two minutes into the second period gave the Sports a 4-2 advantage, but Acton then exploded for four consecutive goals. Baker scored twice for a hat-trick, while Tim and Rob Evans recorded the other goals.

Steve Crossman notched a pair as the Pro Sports fought right back in the third period, and when Tom Davies scored at the 17:28 mark, it appeared the leaders had survived a close shave.

Rob Evans scored for Acton to tie it at 7-7 with

just 42 seconds left on the clock, and Floyd Hillier fired the winner four seconds later.

In other action, Hollywood Tavern took advantage of Acton's win over the Sports with a 5-4 decision over the Riviera Raiders, to move into first place in the four-team league.

Larry Peterson's goal, from Brian Beaumont and Dave Holmes at the 17:49 mark of the final period, proved to be the winner. Randy Robbins, Bruce McPhail, Holmes and Ian Syme all found the range for the Norval crew.

Doug Barnes paced the Raiders with a pair of goals, while Pat Tunney and Jim Pearson added single markers.

Hollywood Tavern now leads the league with eight wins and a pair of ties in 13 outings. Next are the Pro Sports, with 17 points, and the Riviera Raiders, with 14. Acton brings up the rear with a win and a tie in 13 games.

Hollywood Tavern and Acton will square off in the early game this Sunday (8:30 a.m.) while the Raiders and the Pro Sports are next on the ice at 10:30 a.m.

The licence fees for the year 1984 are as follows:

- Female or Male \$12.00
- Spayed Female or Neutered Male \$ 9.00
- Kennel Licence \$25.00

In accordance with the Town of Halton Hills By-law, every owner of a dog on or before February 15th in any calendar year, or within 7 days of becoming the owner of a dog after February 15th, must apply for, and upon payment of the prescribed fee, be issued a licence and a dog tag for each dog in his/her possession.

No person shall keep more than three (3) dogs over the age of 3 months at any one location unless he/she is in possession of a valid Town of Halton Hills Kennel Licence.

No person shall allow a dog to run at large at any time.

Every person who fails to obtain a dog or kennel licence for the current year or who permits a dog to run at large will be in contravention of the by-law, and upon conviction be liable to a fine of not less than \$15.00 and not more than \$50.00 excluding costs.
