Happy over proposal to UN

Members of the former "Vote Yes for Disarmament" group in Acton and Georgetown were delighted to learn recently that their campaign of a year ago has been taken one step further.

It was announced recently in Ottawa that a proposal for a world referendum on disarmament will soon be taken

to the United Nations, by the government of Costa Rica.

This has always been the ultimate goal of Operation Dismantle, an Ottawa-based organization which coordinated the holding of similar referendums across Canada within the last 2 years.

"That's good news" says Linda Bobor, a member of the former "Vote Yes" group which

persuaded Halton Hills Council to hold the referendum. Elden Comfort of Acton added "I feel vindicated with respect to our efforts last fall to get this referendum before our own municipality." Mr. Comfort and Ms. Bobor are both members of the new "Halton Hills Action for Nuclear Disarmament"

dy most UN members have indicated their willingness to hold such a vote, once the motion is endorsed in New York. This includes Russla and the Warsaw Pact nations.

The Soviet Embassy in Ottawa has confirmed that there is "no reason" to refuse such a referendum, and, with most nations agreeable to holding the referendum, it would become difficult to refuse.
