Cheltenham residents have been assured by Ontario environment minister, Andy Brandt that the relocation of Brampton Brick is not a fait accompli.

Several members of People for the Preservation of Rural Living met last Wednesday with Mr. Brandt and several officials from the environment and natural resources ministries.

"Mr. Brandt told us that the relocation of Brampton Brick was not a fait accompli," said group member Shelley Rahn. "People have been telling us we shouldn't bother fighting because they say the move is inevitable. Well, the assurances we received are why we bothered to fight."

Group delegates included Alan Hunter, Drew and Shelley Rahn, Roger Willoughby, Russ Regie. Their lawyer George Finlayson first outlined concerns about air, water, noise pollution, increased traffic.

It will look at alternative locations," said Mrs. Rahn.

Mayor Russ Miller attended the meeting and assured the 10 people present that with budget meetings starting, their concerns will be considered in planning for 1985.

One lady was angered because of a car accident she was in Boxing Day at the corner of Shelly and Edward, costing her \$900 in repairs. The road surface was so slippery she couldn't stop - even the police agreed about the condition of the road, she said.

Councillor Finn Poulstrup said usually the works department have a system of sanding the intersections and stop areas, but he said the department would be contacted.

A comment was made

about snowplows needlessly sanding Delrex Blvd. while leaving Byron and Shelly Streets unserviced.

A man said he was worried about the embankments at the intersection of Mountainview and Guelph Streets, making it inaccessible to the elderly.

Councillor Phil Carney said he would review the situation with the works department to see what could be done.

Mayor Miller said the concerns he heard at the drop-in emphasizes the issue and he can bring up the problems at budget meetings. He has had discussions about new types of snow removal equipment, but it's a matter of "dollars and cents", he said.

The Halton R.S.V.P. meeting is planned for March 28. The topic this year is "Communication". Interested rural organizations should apply soon since there is a limited registration of 100.

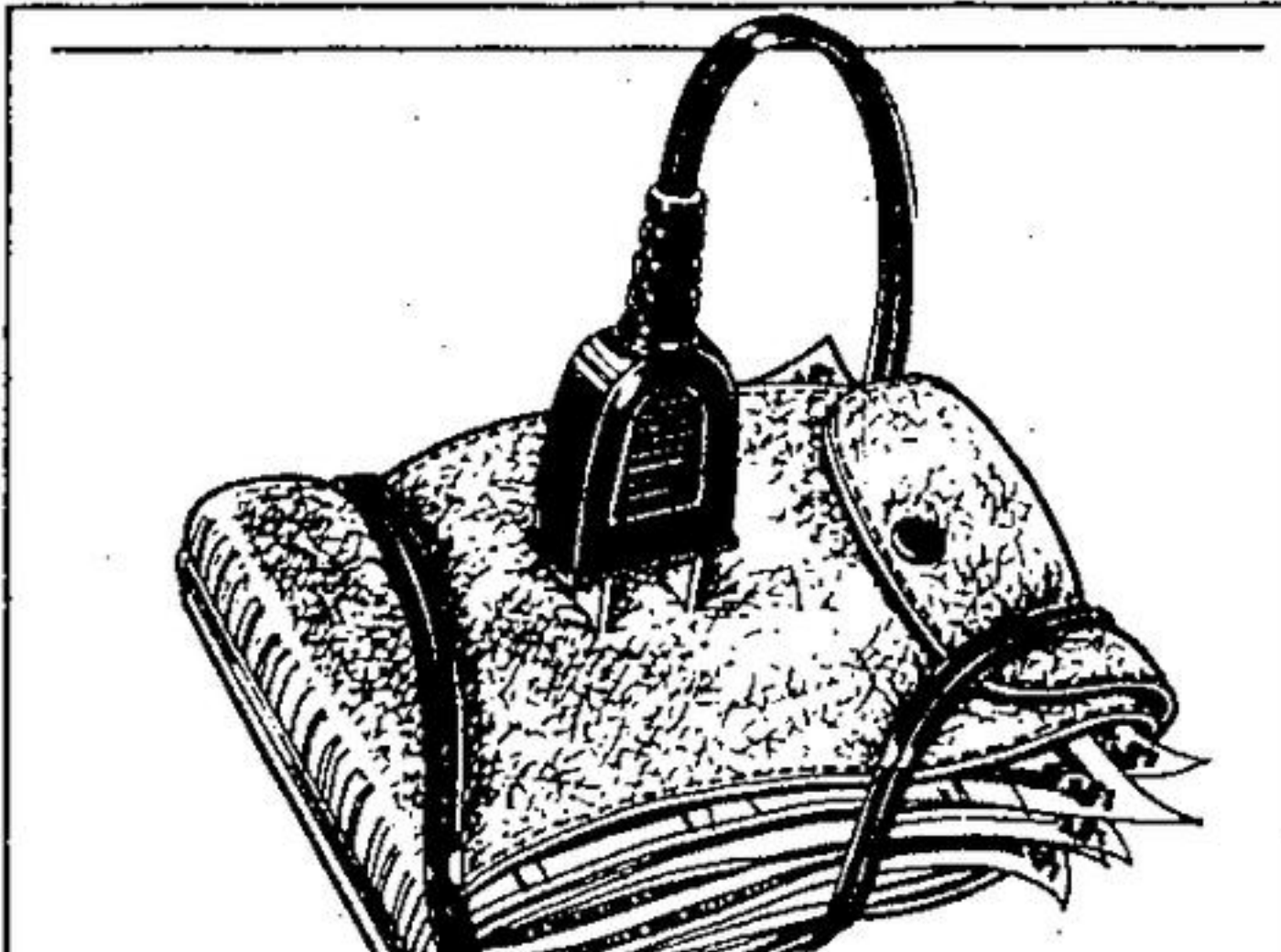

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# Peace camp withdraws appeal

International Peace Camp Inc. has indicated it will carry out studies on 240-acres of land it rents near Speyside, to see if the property can be used as a private recreation centre.

Lawyers for the Peace Camp announced in a letter last week that the Camp officials were withdrawing an appeal against a recent Niagara Escarpment Commission ruling.

The Commission ruled against the recreation proposal, noting that effects on neighboring environmentally-sensitive land and rural residents hadn't been determined.

For its work on a road on the property, the IPC was fined \$250 in provincial court last fall. The letter said the IPC reserves the right to appeal in the future.

Weekend camping, a demonstration farm, recreation fields, buildings and swimming pools are planned as part of the IPC development.

Last year, the IPC proposal came under fire from municipal councillors and neighbors when work was done on the property without the necessary permits from the Commission.

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
