

It could save a child's life Kicking up a fuss

January, 1983 provided much of the impetus behind their work.

Despite studies which have shown close relationships between people who enjoy pornography and engage in violent acts toward women and children, it was noted that the Government of Canada defeated the child pornography bill. Ms. Daigle said politicians are deluding themselves into thinking the problem does not exist in Canada.

Ms. Daigle also stressed that if people don't speak out against these issues, nothing will improve. She described a number of obstacles she has encountered in Oshawa in trying to order sensitive film material as part of the streetproofing program.

Many people, including city police departments are uncomfortable with films dealing with issues such as kidnapping.

However, she said the barrage of letters received as a result of publicity for the program in a recent Canadian Living article demonstrates the desperate need for information and programs across the country.

The program emphasizes the need for children to know the correct names of the parts of the body, so that they will know immediately if their privacy has been invaded. "We can't afford to be non-specific with our children," said Ms. Daigle.

The parents expressed interest in organizing future workshops on streetproofing.

There are times when a child should be taught not to "kick up a fuss" and times when it could save their life. This is the message contained in a children's book, *Kicking Up a Fuss*, which is part of an Oshawa-based streetproofing program designed to stimulate discussion between parents and children.

Maureen Daigle and Angie Youroukis, founding members of Outreach streetproofing program, spoke to a Georgetown parents' group Thursday, Jan. 26 at George Kennedy Public School. Ms. Daigle, a teacher, mother of three and former sexual assault counsellor, was instrumental in producing the book as a teaching tool.

To introduce the local parents to the Outreach program and its goals, the women explained they felt "something should be done to raise the awareness of children's and women's issues." The Sharon Keenan murder in
