Otto Jelinek submits report

Many favor flat tax rate survey finds

There was a good response to Otto Jelinek's (PC-Halton) household survey on tax reform, the results of which were released this week in a press release.

Not surprisingly, the largest number of complaints had to do with the complexity of filling out a tax form and the annoyance of seeking out the services of tax

professionals, Mr. Jelinek says.

The second major suggestion concerned

the implementation of a flat tax rate. Said the report: "The overall consensus was that a large portion of the Halton population would prefer a fixed tax rate of between 10-25 per cent of their gross income, with absolutely no deductions."

Furthermore, it was mentioned that the fixed rate system would "prevent individuals and

businesses from claiming excessive and indeed questionable deductions to reduce or even eliminate their taxable income."

Many felt in the survey that no taxes should be paid on Old Age Security monies and that tax shelters for those over 71 should be established.

There were also concerns about tax laws dealing with child care

expenses for dependant children and for family allowance deductibility. "The general consensus calls for a reasonable increase in deductibility in childcare expenses and a desire to be able to choose which spouse

will pay tax on family allowance income, regardless of which spouse is claiming the child as a dependant," says Mr. Jelinek. For a copy of the letter sent to constituents, call 844-4333.

Taking children aside

Sex education queries

Since children inevitably get sex information from somewhere, it's important they get it right, said the principal at Acton's St. Joseph Roman Catholic School.

Principal Fred Springer told of his nine-year old son's recent comment on viewing the hazy graphic of a man and women's face in a health book—"I know what they're doing. There's a transplant of some seeds."

"He's getting it from somewhere and it's important that he gets it right," Mr. Springer said at Thursday night's Parents' Association meeting. "I've taught

sex education in the school setting, but it's different when you have to sit down with your own child and discuss it with him, because you don't know what he knows."

If a child in the lower grades comes to school with questions about something he's picked up about sex either from home or elsewhere, teachers are expected to handle the situation by taking the child aside and answering his questions, Mr. Springer said.

"It's amazing the kind of information children pick up," he said. "Where they get the concepts, you don't know, but you don't laugh because other-

wise they won't ask the questions."

CAREFULLY

Separate school board teachers have been taught to handle questions to do with sex carefully, and on an individual basis rather than bringing it up for full discussion in the classroom. Mr. Springer said.

November 1981 "The Document of Pope John Paul II on Marriage and Family Life" was issued and gave the Catholic community guidelines on family life education. Mr. Springer played a video of Canadian bishop Marcel Gervais explaining the guidelines.

The board's religion and family life consult-

ants Art Kelly and Joan Cowan were both ill and failed to attend the meeting.

"It is simply wrong that provincial interests, specifically relating to aggregates, should supercede food-land, environmental, recreational and human considerations regarding land use."

The aggregates policy statement would be in effect under the Planning Act.

Comments about the policy are being sought by the province's municipal affairs and housing ministry.
