Candy kids even series

The Georgetown Candy Production peewees defeated Orangeville, 3-2, Thursday night, to even their OMHA play-off series at a game apiece.

The two evenly-matched teams have provided their fans with some exciting action in the first two contests, Georgetown losing the first match, 5-3, in overtime.

Thursday night at Memorial Arena, the locals rallied from a 2-0 deficit to even the series.

Stephen Lee finally scored in the third period, from Jeremy Felce, to pull Georgetown to within a single goal. Just 40 seconds later, Charlie Hancock scored for Georgetown to make it 2-2. Lee and

John Brooker assisted.

Jason Knight counted the winner for Georgetown, from Brian Leslie and Felce, with 10 minutes left in regulation time.

In the series opener last Tuesday in Orangeville, Georgetown twice battled back from single-goal deficits before falling in overtime.

Peaker 2nd

Georgetown's Kevin Peaker turned in an excellent performance at the Kawartha Ski Tour and Race in Apsley, Ont., on the weekend, finishing second in his age category for a silver medal.

Peaker, 17, of Prince Charles Drive, also earned a gold medal award for his excellent time of six hours, 39 minutes, over a rugged 75-kilometer course in terrible conditions. One

of 816 skiers to start the race, Peaker finished just 18 seconds behind the leader in the 17-18 year-old event.

Peaker's father, John, completed the 75-km route in seven hours, eight minutes. The 45-year-old Peaker was fourth in his category (45 and over) missing a bronze medal for third place by just 52 seconds. The elder Peaker also earned a gold medal for his excellent time.

The Peakers were two of six Georgetowners to compete in the annual race, held just north of Peterborough.

Andre Oulmet, of Rexway Drive, competed in the 35-44 year-old division, earning a silver medal for his time of seven hours, 34 minutes.

Nine-year-old Gilles Oulmet completed a 10-km course in one hour, 22 minutes, to earn a gold medal.

Ken and Glen Edwards, also of Georgetown, were the third father-and-son team to tackle the tough Kawartha course. Glen completed a 50-km run in five hours, 38 minutes, good enough for a bronze medal.

Father Ken covered the same distance in just over eight hours.
