

## Police beat

### Snowplow gone

**GLEN WILLIAMS** - An orange Arctic snowplow was stolen from a Glen Williams Main Street residence over the weekend. Halton regional police said the snowplow was worth \$1,200.

### No paper today

**GEORGETOWN** - A Globe and Mail paper box was stolen Friday from Hyland Avenue and Highway 7. The box is worth \$175.

### \$100 donuts

**GEORGETOWN** - There were extensive scratches made to a 1979 Chrysler Le Baron Tuesday between 2 and 2:30 a.m. while the car owner was getting refreshments at a donut shop. Damage has been estimated at \$100.

### School vandalized

**GEORGETOWN** - Two windows at George Kennedy Public School were cracked sometime Sunday causing \$500 damage. Halton regional police are investigating.

### Jewels stolen

**GEORGETOWN** - A Durham Street home was broken into sometime between Friday and Tuesday and \$2,000 worth of jewellery stolen. Halton regional police said thieves entered the front door and made off with various bracelets, rings and earrings.

### Ice causes injuries

**GEORGETOWN** - A 49-year old Georgetown man and his 19-year-old daughter suffered minor injuries Wednesday at 7:40 a.m.

The two were eastbound on Tenth Line near Sideroad 17 when a westbound car slid into their lane due to the extremely slippery road conditions. The eastbound driver attempted to stop but was struck by the other driver, a 20-year old Georgetown man who suffered minor injuries. Damage to both vehicles has been estimated at \$15,000.

### He passed out

**ACTON** - An Acton man who passed out while driving west on Mill Street caused \$2,000 damage to his 1973 Pontiac and was charged by Halton regional police Saturday at 1:55 a.m.

Police said the driver lost control of his vehicle, mounted the north curb, struck a concrete box sign post and came to rest by a Wilbur Street store.

### An icy meeting

**ACTON** - A Confederation Street woman was treated and released from Milton District Hospital Feb. 15 following an early morning accident on Ninth Line.

An Oakville man was discharged from the same hospital Monday.

There was \$10,000 damage when the driver of a 1978 Chevrolet drove around a large puddle on Ninth Line, then lost control of the vehicle on ice when returning to the proper lane.

The Chevrolet swerved over the road and struck a 1982 Honda coming from the opposite direction.

The accident took place just south of Highway 401. Halton regional police laid no charges due to icy road conditions.

## New grants for solar heating

Business and Industries in Halton Hills may be able to benefit from a grant system for solar heating projects says a Rockwood specialist. Rick Niesiobedaki of Comfortech at RR4 Rockwood, says subsidies from both federal and

provincial governments can apply to 65 per cent of the cost of buying and installing solar heating equipment. He said the equipment is most effective in space heating, ventila-

tion pre-heating, make-up air and process heat for both air and liquid systems. He said an accelerated tax write-off and an additional seven per cent tax credit helps

make solar heat an attractive way for a Canadian owned and operated company to reduce energy costs. Deadline for proposals is June 1.

You do not need a degree or diploma to volunteer. All you need is a listening ear, a caring heart and a sense of commitment.

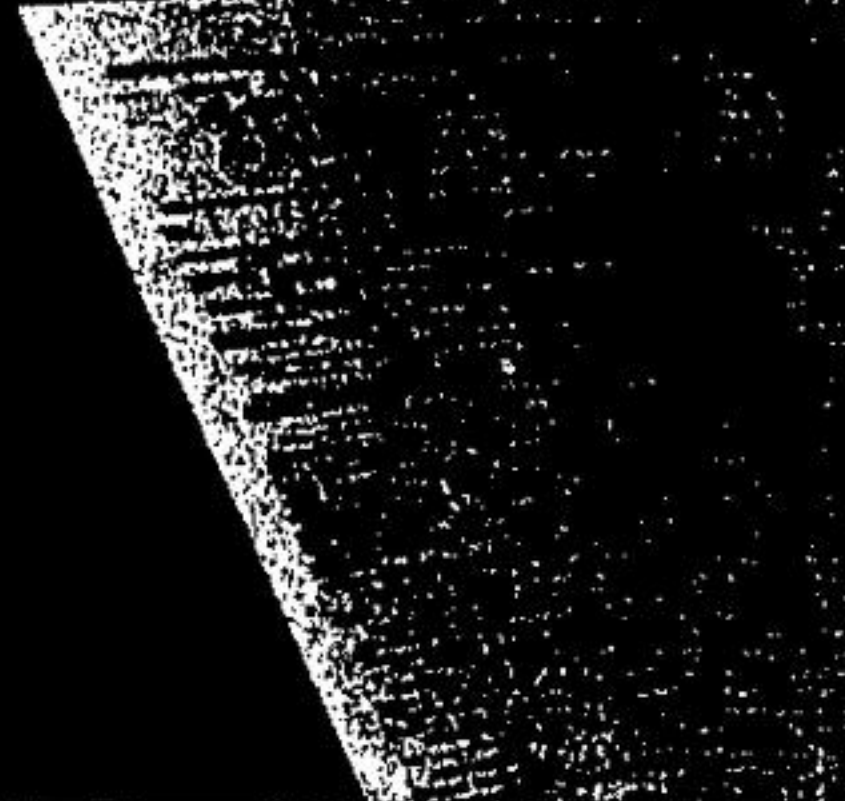
## Watch those sewers

## 1984 TAXES INTERIM BILLING

In accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Act, pursuant to By-Law No. 84-7 adopted by Council on January 9th, 1984, the first two instalments of taxes for 1984 will become due as follows:

### ALL WARDS

First Instalment - February 29, 1984  
Second Instalment - April 25, 1984

The above instalments represent an interim billing of 1984 taxes based upon one-half of last year's residential mill rates. The final tax bill will be issued about the middle of the year and will also be payable in two instalments, normally the last Wednesday in June and September.

Upon default of payment of the interim tax levy as set out above, a penalty of one and one-quarter (1 1/4) percent of the amount in default shall be added on the first day of default and on the first day of each and every calendar month.

Ratepayers who have not received a tax bill should make immediate application at 36 Main Street South, Georgetown, or by telephone (877-5185 or 453-2411).

### PAYMENT OF TAXES

The taxes may be paid at the locations and in the manner detailed on the back of the tax bill.
