The Georgetown District High School swimming Rebels continued to dominate swimming in Ontario, winning the Halton championship for the sixth consecutive year Wednesday at the Etobicoke Olympium.

Rebel swimmers amassed 843 team points to capture the Halton title, 232 points ahead of second-place Q.E. Park. Cross town rivals, the Acton Redmen, made it a great day for Halton Hills, as they accumulated 364 points and a fourth-place team standing.

Both Georgetown and Acton will go on to the Peel-Halton finals, today at the Olympium.

Winning the Haltons is becoming old hat for Georgetown coach Tom Adams, and it showed in his postmeet comments.

"It was a good meet for us," he said. "All our kids performed well.

The Rebels topped both the junior and senior competitions. The junior Rebs earned 348 points, good enough to edge out Q.E. Park at 335. The senior Rebels ran away and hid, with 497 points, almost double the 276 points earned by the Q.E. Park seniors.

Rebel swimmers accumulated eight individual firsts, 17 seconds, and 12 thirds. Four Georgetown relay teams swam to firsts, setting new Halton records along the way.

Six times Georgetown swimmers finished one-two in races, and twice Rebel swimmers were first and third. The senior girls medley relay




