With the studies complete, the foundation is pursuing opportunities with the ministry of natural resources, he sald. These opportunities might include an arrangement through the ministry for the Credit Valley Conservation Authority (CVCA) to manage the property

for the foundation. A horse park could also be a possible corollary use as an outdoor recreational use under ministry supervision, Mr. Court said.

CVCA general manager Glen Schnarr said he is "disappointed" the authority has not made more progress in its attempts to work out an arrangement

with the foundation. "We said we were most interested in managing the property," Mr. Schnarr said. "Although we indicated we had some concern about the impact of property taxes on the situation, we suggested alternatives to offset those taxes at no cost to the foundation."

One of the CVCA alternatives would have the foundation leasing the property.
