Bob Rae critical of opponents

The provincial government is ignoring "dramatic life changes" which are affecting society today, Ontario NDP leader Bob Rae charged Friday night.

Mr. Rae told members of the Halton-Burlington NDP Riding Association packed into the Milton United fuln Workers Hall that the government's thinking "can be found somewhere between 1943 and 1960".

There are changes in the workforce, technology and family which beg a government response, Mr. Rae said. Much of his speech assailed the Tory administration for not recognizing the equality

of men and women in

the workforce. He pointed to the government's recent Throne Speech in which the government said it would not force business to adopt "equal pay for equal work" policies. EQUALITY

"It will be eighteen hundred years before we have genuine equality in the workforce at the rate the Tories are going," the NDP leader commented.

"We take pride in being the party which has said women have

the same rights to a fair salary and just as much right to work as a man

Women are being trapped in job ghettos because they're being

overlooked in terms of

job and salary advancement, Mr. Rae said. He also attacked job policies which force workers to retire at 65. The social security system should be such that older workers can retire comfortably, allowing younger workers to move into the

workforce. In education, the Tories have "starved" the system, Mr. Rae said by not providing retraining and skills apprenticeship programs.

He also criticized government policies on reforestration, health care (by leaving nursing homes to private operators) and the

environment. Lake Ontario, Mr. Rae said, is a "chemical potpourrie" adding that the close relationship the government has with industrial polluters is a "recipe for shortterm profit, not to protect the integrity of community life."

The NDP, Mr. Rae said, places the community as the most important component of the province's future."

Councillors' voting block has a unique opportunity

None of the six locations picked as possibilities for the region's new landfill site are in Halton Hills, but councillors here may form a very important voting block when the region makes a decision later this year.

Peter Walker, head of the consulting firm which is handling the region's landfill search studies, told members of the town's general committee Monday night that the "region will have one beck of a decision to make".

The landfill issue is of such a "crisis" nature, Mr. Waiker said, counclilors will be torn between the urgency of finding a new landfill site and the chance it might be located in their

respective wards. FINAL CHOICES

The landfill search, which is being carried out under the provisions of the Environmental Assessment Act, is nearing an end. Once consultants have presented council with their final choices, the region is expected to make a decision this fall. (The choice will have to be endorsed by the province).

Halton Hills' regional councillors, unfettered by the political turmoil a landfill site in town would cause, should be able to "vote more freely than other councillors from other municipalities", Mr. Walker

Candidate sites have been chosen in Milton, Oakville and Burling-

INCINERATOR (The Ontario Waste Management Corp. (OMWC) is also looking for a site for its industrial waste incinerator or landfill site. A number of candidate sites are in Halton but none are located in Halton Hills. The two searches are separate).

Mr. Walker urged local and regional councillors in Halton Hills to become well-informed of the landfill search and "not turn your backs on all the documenta" because no sites in Halton Hills have been chosen.

In an earlier phase of the study, there was a candidate "area" In Halton Hills, as well as quarry mentioned as a possible landfill site.

They were dropped from the search when they failed to meet the social, economical and

environmental criteria

established by the consultants.

However, regional council or the province may wish to review the sites mentioned, but not

Late this summer, Halton's only remaining landfill site will close. By that time, the region hopes it will be able to expand the current dump in Burlington in the first of four phases.


