Paul Brodie holds music workshop for GDHS students

GDHS concert band members are busy these days brushing up for April 11 and the visit of the internationally famous saxophonist Paul Brodie. Besides conducting the workshop on saxophone techniques, Mr. Brodie will perform two numbers accompanied by band conductor Harry Hamilton and the concert band ("Strawflower" by Ralph Hermann and "Nightfall" by John J. Morrissy).

Mr. Brodie enjoys working with young music students. His session at GDHS will take place Wednesday afternoon as an extra to his main performance that evening at the John Elliott Theatre.

The concert and workshop is being sponsored by the Halton Hills Arts Council. Mr. Brodie takes pains to point out that he is a concert performer, not a jazz player. "The way I play the instru-

ment is as a classical player. People are still surprised to hear it played as it was intended!"

The evening concert will include light classical numbers of a certain vintage (1915-30) featuring composers such as Fritz Kreisler and Revere as well as some of the legendary Rudy Wiedoeft pieces which inspired many a youth in the Twenties to play the sax - Rudy Vallee for instance.

Mr. Brodie's accompanist for the evening will be Myriam Schechter who has recorded four albums with Mr. Brodie. Miss Schechter is a native of Rumania and is a graduate of the Faculty of Music at Tel Aviv.

Although Mr. Callaghan doesn't pipe, the members of the band must all have an interest in piping and drumming, and be willing to take part in parades.

One of the pipe band's major goals is to visit Scotland and perform at the games and parades there. Hopefully they'll realize that goal next year.
