

Landfill site in Halton Hills

Consultant's error changes situation

Garbage may be dumped in Halton Hills one day.

A landfill site at the northeast corner of Steeles Avenue and Tenth Line is one of four

small sites planning consultants Walker, Wright, Young Associates Limited have identified as a possible regional landfill site.

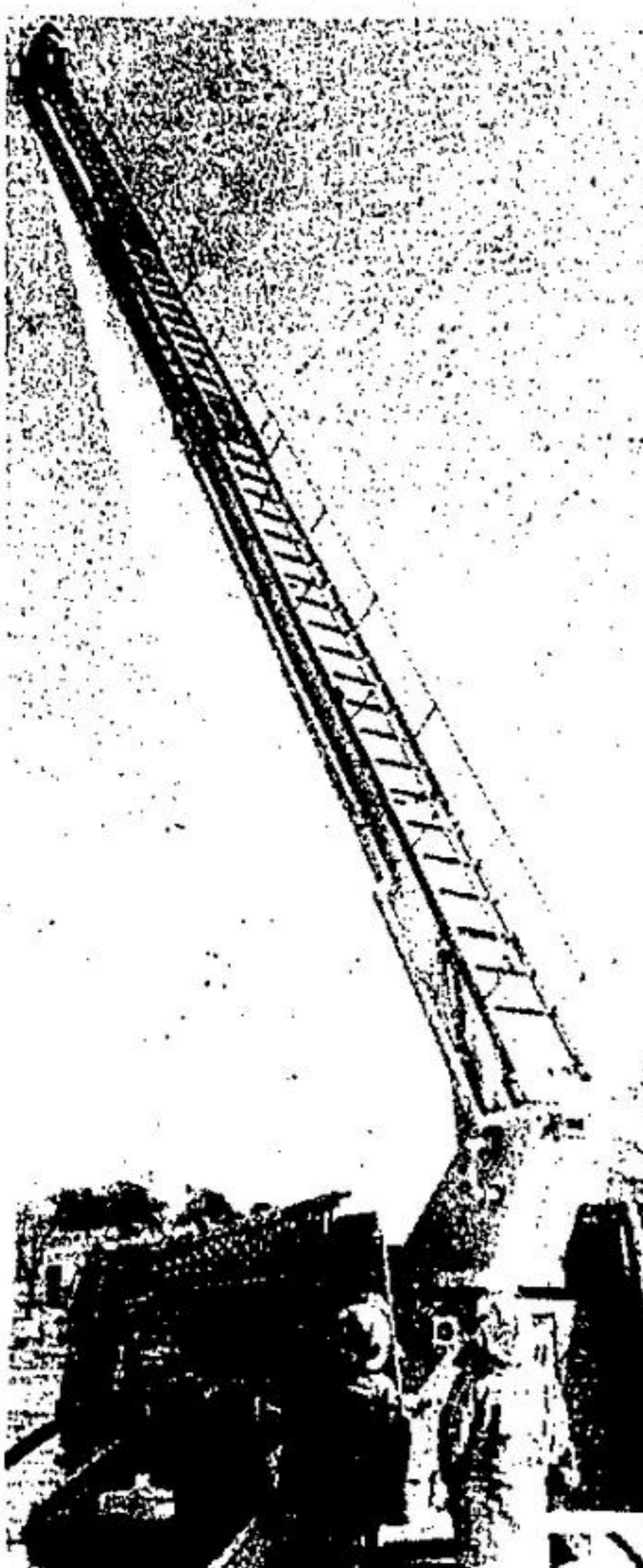
Last week, the head of the consulting firm which is handling the

region's landfill search studies told the town's general committee there were no sites in Halton Hills.

"I regret having not flagged this to council's attention, but there must have been a ment-

al blank at the time because I did know it was in Halton Hills and it was no more than about five minutes after I left the meeting when I realized what I had said," Peter Walker wrote to the town's clerk administrator March 27.

The other three small sites aren't in Halton Hills. The region is expected to make a decision this fall for a regional landfill site, and candidate sites have been chosen in Milton, Oakville and Burlington.

Reed waits for answer about gravel policy

Halton-Burlington MPP Julian Reed wants Resources Minister Alan Pope to comment on whether he will hold public meetings about a new aggregate policy.

Halton Hills council requested the minister hold the meetings before the aggregate policy forms part of the Planning Act at the end of this month.

A similar provincial policy on floodplain management resulted in public meetings.

Mr. Reed has been trying for three days to ask Pope about the request during question period in the legislature but the minister has not been in the house.

The housing ministry says the policy was presented for public scrutiny when it was

given to the Association of Municipalities of Ontario (AMO) for comment, Mr. Reed said.
