There are nine students involved in the production of stage sets, 25 in makeup, 12 in costumes and 12 in publicity.

With a double cast, 30 students are involved in the acting end of the play. Some are playing double parts.

Amber lights for Delrex corner

Herald Staff Recognizing the number of accidents and near accidents at the busy Deirex Boulevard and Maple Avenue intersection in Georgetown, a number of recommendations have been made by the region.

Director of public works R.W.J. Moore suggests a flashing amber-red overhead beacon be put at the intersection: that flashing amber beacons be Introduced over the existing school crossing signs, to operate only during morning, noon and afternoon crossing periods, to be activated by crossing guards; and put up special school crossing markings for east and westbound traffic Maple on Avenue.

The suggestions were made in a report by Mr. Moore at the request of town Coun. John Mc-Donald last fall.






