Tom Gross scored a pair of first-period goals to stake Georgetown to a 2-0 lead over Barrie in the midget exhibition

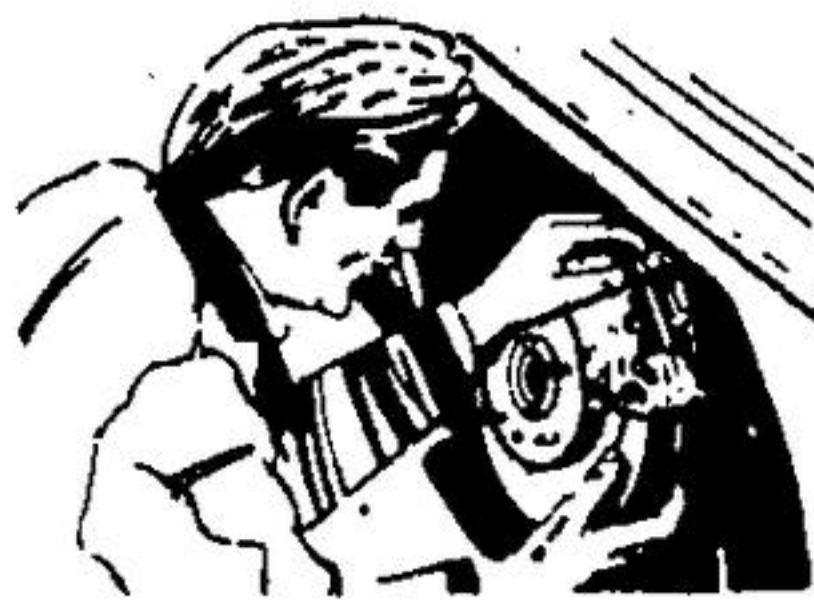
game, but the visitors came roaring back with five consecutive markers.
