Tuitman plants usher in spring

There are plants that will do well in Florida which will not do well here, and there are plants that will do well in Oakville that might not do so well in Milton.

This information comes from Len Tuitman who, with his wife Elly, operates Tuit-man's Garden Centre and Landscaping.

Planting areas are divided into zones with the difference being about one zone, between Oakville and Milton. "Milton is cooler and has a little later summ-

er," Mr. Tuitman said. While working as an accountant in Holland, Len Tultman decided he needed a change. After immigrating to Canada in 1970 he worked briefly with the City of Mississauga Parks Department and has now been involved in gardening and landscaping for twelve years.

WOODEN SHOES "They may not know my name but they might recognize me by my wooden shoes and beard," he said.

Tultman's Garden Centre and Landscaping is located on Highway 25 just south of Acton. The 40 acre site has about 150 varieties of plants ranging from fruit trees

to rose bushes. The Tuitmans will not

only provide the plants for a garden but, if the customers asks, the actual design. "A garden may be easy or intensive, depending on how much time they (the customers) want to spend on it," stated Mr. Tuitman.

"A nice, garden will add to the beauty, and the retail value of a house."

EYE-CATCHING One new trend in gardening which the Tuitmans provide, is a special process the nurseries use called grafting. Plants that would normally grow into shrubs are grafted onto long stems which gives them an "eye-catching", tree-like effect.

The Tultmans cite late April and early May as their busiest time of the year. "A lot of people still think that you can only plant in Spring or Fall, all our plants are potted up, and you can plant them on the hottest day in July," explained Mr.

"People tend to overwater their plants and end up drowning them." The only problem the Tuitmans can see with the plants they provide, is the periodical weeding of the garden.




