There's a new monkey in town who needs help from young children to find a name for itself! The mankey is the


mascot of the North Hatton Toy Library, and all children up to age 7 are invited to submit their idea for a name by May 31.

available during the day. The annual May Flower Show will be part of the next meeting on Wednesday May 16 at which time Prue Crookston will demonstrate flower arranging.




