If I should die and go to hockey heaven (although there is every indication I'm heading in the opposite direction), I'll be provided with a second opportunity to rub elbows with the collection of shinny talent I mingled with Friday night.

I was the guest of Raider general manager and hockey fanatic Dave Kentner at an NHL Oldtimers dinner in Markham. Kentner, regional chairman Pete Pomeroy and I made the 30-mile trek down Highway 7 to meet Murray Ezeard, an oldtime Georgetown and Milton hockey star who has been rubbing shoulders with some of the best players ever to lace on skates for the past 40 years.

If you know Murray Ezeard, as I can boast, you'll never have any trouble meeting hockey greats. I wans't in the door five minutes when Mr. Ezeard (I'll never be able to call him Murray) asked me if there was anyone in particular I would like to meet.

I hesitated. I certainly didn't need name tags to recognize, in one quick glance about the hall, the likes of Carl Brewer, Bob Baun, Punch Imlach, Bob Goldham and Brian MacFarlane. LEAF LEGEND

Mr. Ezeard quickly grabbed hold of Maple Leaf legend Wilfred 'Bucko' McDonald. Once the most-feared body-checker in the game, Bucko (we're practically best friends, now) looks fit enough at age 72 to catch on as the fifth Raider rearguard.

That's a point that didn't pass by Kentner. He got McDonald's autograph, for his daughter, of course. Look for that signature to turn up on an OHA player card in October.

Next stop included a hand-shake with Hockey Hall of Fame member Joe Primeau. I told the former Leaf center and NHL all-star how honored I was to meet him, after hearing and reading so much about his great career.

His puck-handling skills have, slowed considerably at age 79, but his mind is agile. Primeau smiled up at me, and asked wryly if I had been frequenting local police stations.

A couple of drinks down the road, we sat down for dinner. That gave me a good opportunity to peruse the various tables. I'm a great one for stor-gazing.

At the table beside us were seated a half-dozen former Toronto Toros, including former Leaf and New York Ranger pin-up idol Pat Hickey. Wayne Dillon and Gavin Kirk were there.

MC MacFarlane introduced a few more 'names' just before dinner, including former Leaf GM Jim Gregory, all-time great 'Ace' Bailey, Leaf publicist Stan Obodiac and Oshawa lawyer and

superfan, Terry Kelly. The guest speakers for the night were former Chicago Black Hawk coach Rudy Pilous, and Canadian sports legend Red Storey.

Storey summed it up best when he commented that he had "never been in a room in my life with so many star athletes. This is hockey

Pilous talked at length about the changes hockey has endured over the past 25 years, including the advent of the curved blade, and the influence European players have had on the pro game.

"The Swedes we had in Winnipeg (the WHA champion Jets) played hard and entertained people," Pilous said. "Bobby Hull, teamed with Ulf Nillson and Anders Hedberg, was a pleasure to watch."

Blue Fin earns gold

Georgetown swimmer Julie Arnold raced to a gold medal in the 50-meter butterfly stroke event at the Ontario 'AAAA' swimming championships last weekend in Guelph.

Arnold, 10, competed for the Halton Hills Blue Fins in four events during the three-day competition. She won her gold medal on Saturday, the second day of competition, covering two 25-meter laps of the pool in 40.82 seconds.

Arnold was fifth in the 100-meter freestyle event, in a time of 1:24:04. She was 10th in both the 50-meter freestyle and 50-meter breast stroke.

Five other Blue Fins turned in top performances at the Guelph championships. Eduardo Piqueras won a fourth in the 100-meter back stroke for boys 10 and under. He

added a fifth in the 200-meter freestyle event later in the meet. Cam Comen, competing in the boys 11-12 category, was fourth in the 200-meter back stroke.
