Local wrestler is Canadian champ

Canadian wrestling champion. Power, 16, of Gower Court, topped 17 wrestlers from all across the country to win the gold medal in the 130-pound division at the Canadian Midget Wrestling Championships, Saturday at Erindale Secondary School in Mississauga.

The Georgetown Rebel wrestler won six matches, including a thrilling semi-final against his friend and Rebel teammate Scott Pundsack, enroute to the national title. He won the gold medal by narrowly outpointing Sarnia's Karl Bulitka, 2-1, in the final.



Gymnast Gail not a quitter

Sometimes, not knowing when to quit can work to your advantage.

If Gail Cook had listened to her doctor, her coach, or her parents three years ago, she would not have won a silver medal at the provincial high school gymnastics championships two weeks ago.

She would have called it a career April 17, 1981, when she came tumbling off the mini-tramp during a work-out, badly dislocating her left elbow. She suffered severe nerve and ligament damage, and spent the next year undergoing extensive physiotheraphy just to regain somewhat normal use of the limb.

Gail, now 17, didn't go near a gym for the next 18 months. Dr. Charles Bull, a Mississauga Sports injury specialist, made it clear he wanted Gail to retire from competitive gymnastics. She refused to listen.

"He advised me not to go back to the gym," she smiles today. "It wasn't quite an order, but he made it clear he felt I shouldn't.

"I was getting bored, though, and I wanted to compete again. I was so close to making it to the provincial finals when I fell, that I just had to go back and train hard. I felt I could still make it."

Employing an 'if-you-can't-beat-them-jointhem' attitude, Dr. Bull manufactured Gail a special metal brace for her weak arm.

"I could be out forever, but I want to come back so badly. I'll have to train all summer with weights, and swimming in the pool. It was worth it, this time. though. It would be worth it again, to make it back to OFSAA."

Determined to overcome her handicap, Gail int the weights. A steady diet of bench presses and curls, three nights a week.

It appeared she had come to the end of the

road again in 1983, after an accidental fall down the stairs in the Dawson Crescent home. She smashed her tender elbow against the ralling, redamaging the nerves, and Dr. Bull became even more adamant that Gall retire. Of course, Gail didn't quit. She persevered,

turning her misfortune into a personal triumph. At the OFSAA finals two weeks ago, Gail narrowly missed the Elite 'B' gold medal by a fraction of a scoring point. "First of all, I thought it was a mistake,"

Gail said about her silver-medal performance. "I was just glad to be going to OFSAA. I didn't think I would place, and I didn't come first or second in any individual event." Now Gail is facing another challenge. She is

scheduled for surgery at St. Michael's Hospital in Toronto this July, to repair the nerve and ligament damage, and remove bone chips from the area. This time, even Gall is ready to accept retirement. She has been living with pain for three

years now. Enough is enough. "I could be out forever, but I want to come back so badly," she snys. "I'll have to train all summer, with the weights, and swimming in the

"It was worth it this time, though. It would be worth it again, to make it back to OFSAA." If three years of pain, frustration and hard work haven't taught Gail about quitting, it's unlikely she will ever learn.
