Limehouse woman off to Bolivia



Jessie Pattullo, 19, of RRI Limehouse, is one of approximately 60 Ontario young people recently selected to participate in the 1984-85 Canada World Youth program.

Canada World Youth is a Canadian non-profit organization which proposes youth exchanges between Canada and

Third World countries. Now in its 13th year of operation, 32 exchange countries have been involved with a total of over 6,000 young people from Canada and exchange countries having participated.

Jessie will participate in the program for a period of seven months. Her particular exchange is with the landlocked South American country of Bolivia. The Third World experience is only one part of the Canada World Youth program, however, and Jessie will first spend three and a half months on the Atlantic coast along with 20 other Canadians from across the country and 21 Bolivians.

During this time, Jessie will live with a local family and be involved in a community-oriented work project. At the beginning of September the entire group will depart for Bolivia where they will also live with families and work in communities for a similar three and a half month period. Jessie will return to Canada in December.

Canada World Youth is a program available to young people aged 17 to 20. Applications are

One number for elderly unnecessary, rejoins information centres claim

Having 'one number' that seniors in the region can call for information isn't necessary, the region's health and social services committee was told Tuesday afternoon.

Representatives from the region's five information centres, including Georgetown's Contact Centre and Acton's Social Services and Information Centre, think it'll be duplicating existing services for the elderly.

The single phone number idea was suggested in a recently released report on the elderly. The consultants' study looked at regional planning for the needs of the elderly.

"It's an idea that's been kicked around for some time," Acton Social Services and Information Centre's executive director Peggie Balkind said.

DISADVANTAGE She said a disadvantage of the recommendation is that seniors will feel they're calling a 'nebulous number'. They won't know where

they're calling and won't feel close to help.

"Most seniors like to drop in. They aren't as comfortable on the phone," Mrs. Balkind said. "A central number doesn't have that kind of accessibility for them."

In a letter to the region's health and social services committee, Mrs. Balkind said she was concerned over what appeared to be "a heavy emphasis" on one central information number.

Mrs. Balkind said Acton's centre, like the region's other information centres, gives assistance to many seniors, in the form of information, in filling out forms or in contacting government agencies.

"Since the area already has an information centre, one has to question the need for a regional centre," she wrote.

ONE NUMBER Having one phone number for the region would be "very pricey", Mrs. Balkind also noted.

"We aren't objecting to the report. Everything else in the study is certainly good," she said.

"We just want to make them aware that there are information centres that give information to seniors."

Credit Valley Artisans reorganizing

The Artisans held their annual general meeting at The Cottage last Wednesday evening (May 16) chaired by Acting President Garnet Goodwill.

In common with many organizations the Artisans have had great difficulties in recent times in obtaining personnel willing and able to assist in the administration of their activities.

The retiring executive, in a letter to its members, prior to the meeting, had proposed two specific constitutional changes.

The first was that each of the three member groups - the Heritage Weavers, the Potters, and the Pallet and Pencil Club - must assume the responsibility of supplying two executive members to the general executive. Previously the executive was drawn from the membership at large.

The second was that each group would be responsible for offering

courses to the public in subjects related to their basic interests rather than to throw all of this responsibility on a Course Director.

These proposals, after serious discussion were adopted unanimously. It was very gratifying that volunteers for all the executive positions came forward to provide a complete slate for the year 1984-85.

The new executive is as follows: President - Margaret Searle; Vice Pres. - Ruth Gibson; Treas. - Jette VanderMeiden; Secty. - Frank Anthony; Publicity - Konnie Karlsson; Newsletter - Saskia Post; Registrar - Albert Dewdney.

The financial report given by the outgoing treasurer Anne Goodwill showed a favorable bank balance at year-end somewhat larger than that of the previous year. Of some note is the fact that the courses run during the year showed a net loss.
