"It's not much of a business to be in if you don't enjoy books, but, the book idealist isn't the best one to run a shop," he admitted. His red-haired wife

"It's only after a while that you get the feeling for the size of stock you should have at

a particular time of the year," Mr. Holt said.

The book shop owner for three years now, he said July is a slow month, with the peak period being from mld-November to Christmas

and early January. "I put books in to indulge myself." Mr. Holl said, his face breaking into a boyish grin. "And, so often, I find I'm the only one who appreciates them."

Best sellers in the shop are cookbooks. There are four shelves of them. Royalty books, baby rearing and family care books are big in Georgetown too.
