

Chargers claim title at North Halton track meet

Record-setting performances by teammates Tara Burroughs and Bob Donker powered the Centennial Chargers to victory at the six-school North Halton Track and Field Championships, last Thursday at Nelson Stadium in Burlington.

The Chargers amassed 430 points to narrowly out-point W.I. Dick School of Milton, second at 423. Another Halton Hills school, Stewarttown, came third overall with 340 points.

Donker, 12, set new marks in both the junior boys 600- and 1,500-meter races, while 13-yearold Burroughs set standards for intermediate girls in the 200- and 400meter events.

Another Charger, junior Jennifer Arnold, set

a new mark in the 1500meter race. Arnold also picked up a pair of second-place ribbons, in the junior 400 meters and the high jump. The winningest Char-

Acton middle distance runner Doreen Uranick smashed the old Canad. ian high school record for 800-meters on her way to a second-place finish in that event at the OFSAA track and field championships, held Friday and Saturday at Etobicoke's Centennial Stadium.

Uranick covered the 800-meters in 2:06:11. just 16 one-hundredths of a second behind winner Elise Braithwaite of Elmwood High School in Ottawa. Both runners' times smashed the standing OFSAA, Canadian high school and Canadian junior open records for that event.

Uranick also took third in the senior girls 400-meter sprint, on riday.

Acton High School's other track sensation, George Gidman, finished second overall in the senior 800-meter event. behind Robert Kichuk of Agincourt, Gidman's time was 1:53:23, a mere 36 one-hundredths of a second behind the winne.

Gidman also managed to finish eighth overall in the 400-meter competition, although he failed to qualify for the final in that event.

Ten athletes from Georgetown District High School also competed at the OFSAA meet, which is the largest track and field competition of its kind in North America. All together, some 2,200 athletes from 480 Ontario high schools gathered in Etobicoke, representing five provincial regions.
