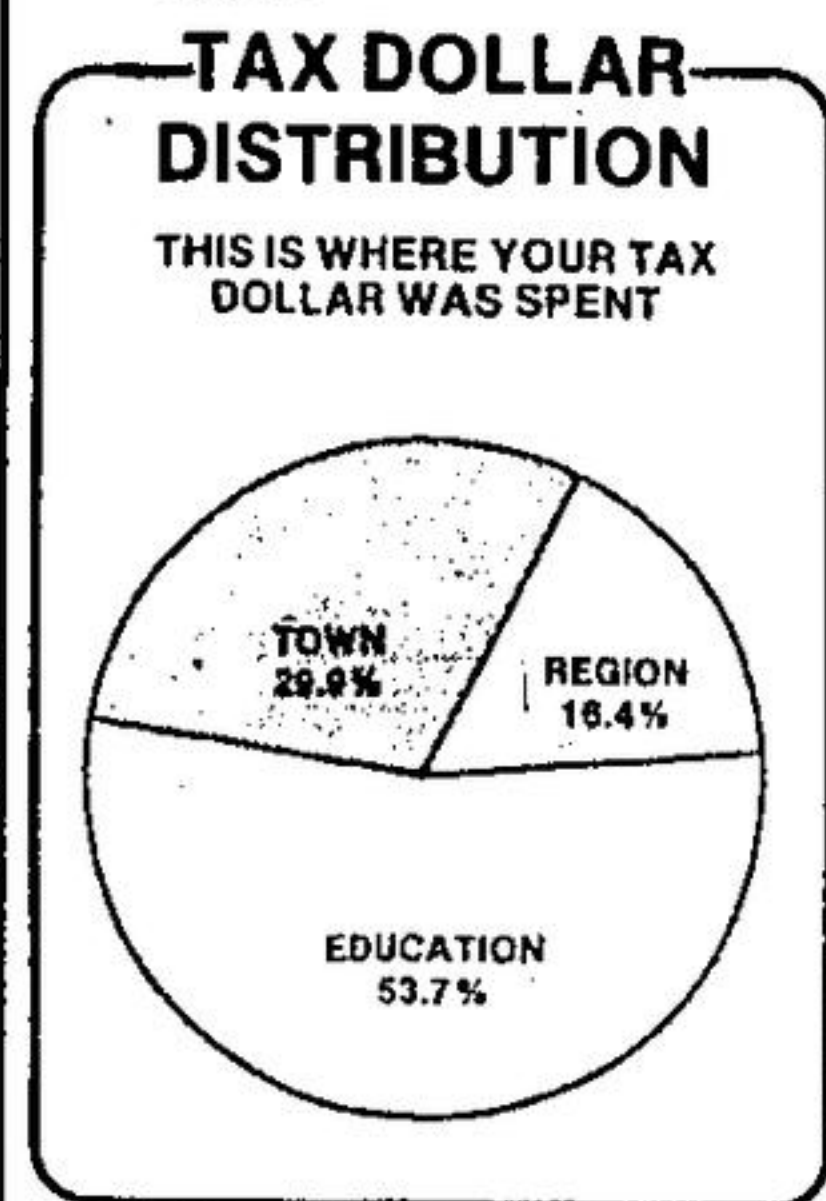

MESSAGE FROM THE MAYOR

TO THE RATEPAYERS OF HALTON HILLS:

On behalf of Council, I am pleased to provide some of the highlights for the Town of Halton Hills financial operations for 1983.

- The year-end surplus for general Town purposes amounted to \$145,844
- The Town's reserves and reserve funds amount to \$2,170,901 as of December 31st, 1983. This represents an increase of \$144,616 over 1982. The majority of these funds have been allocated for specific purposes and future Capital Projects.
- During 1983 Capital Projects with gross expenditures amounting to \$2,237,946 were carried out. Projects included purchase of fire equipment, road construction, erosion control projects, public works vehicles, improvement in streetlighting, and parks and recreation improvements.
- The Town's long term debt position remains very sound as Council again followed the "pay-as-you-go" policy for financing Capital Projects.
