Golf tourney will pass \$75,000 mark

Walt Dixon, owner of the Park Lincoln car dealership on Highway 7, is no different than many of us in that he has lost a close relative to cancer.

Because Walt is neither a doctor or scientist, there is little he can do at the grass roots level, about the killer disease that claimed both his grandfathers. However, because he is a successful businessman, there is a little bit he can do. Every year Walt puts a brand new

automobile up for grabs at the annual Bill Smith Charity Golf Tournament. If some lucky golfer connects for a hole-in-one on any one of five par threes at the North Hatton Golf and Country Club, they drive home in a new car. Walt has never had occasion to hand over a

set of ignition keys yet. He hopes this will be the year. He wants someone to win that brand new

The Smith charity tourney tees off Monday morning. Some 220 golfers will play 18 holes in an attempt to win one of five new cars, free vacations, and hollday weekends in Toronto luxury hotels.

A free Las Vegas vacation, and a trip-fortwo anywhere Air Canada flies, will be raffled off at the dinner following the day of golf. There will be prizes for all 220 participants.

Bill Smith, former mayor of Halton Hills and owner of a successful auto parts business, started the tournament eight years ago after playing in a similar event in Toronto, in aid of Muscular Dystrophy research.

The Smith tourney is now a happening. Last year he raised \$16,500 for the battle against cancer and after the proceeds from this year's tourney are collected, he will have topped the \$75,000 mark. .

Really, Smith is the ideal guy to be handling this event. And it's his baby. He has tapped into the money tree, calling on local merchants and his closest business associates to support the cause.

He is a relentless recruiter, and a convincing salesman. He has the contacts, the organizational know-how, and the drive to make it come off year after year.

Case in point. Smith sells each hole of the tourney to sponsors at \$100 a crack. He has sold 94

holes this year. Every January Smith assembles a 12-man committee to hit up the local business community

for prizes for all 220 golfers. No small chore. But Smith knows who the people are who have the most to give, and to their credit, they come through for him every year. "I guess that tells you that local business

and industry want to get in on this business. because they believe that cancer can be beaten," Smith says proudly. Of course, you can't forget the golfers. After

all, they do shell out \$45 for a round of golf. The first \$15 goes straight into the Georgetown Cancer Society coffers.

And it's not like Smith has been in this all alone from day one. He's had the help of some of the finest men in the community in nurturing the tournament into the monster it is today. Men like Walt Dixon, who put up the first car

eight years ago. And former Hydro manager Graham Farnell. Kenny Sproule of Rexway Towing. Art Roos of Roos Travel. Labelmasters' Guy Melton. Barry Kedwell, of Cruwood Packaging.

"I guess the basic thing is the cause," Walt Dixon said when asked why he supports the tournament year after year. "Very few families

haven't been touched by cancer. "And with the enthusiasm of Bill Smith, well, you just wouldn't dare back out."
