In their first game in the Mid-Ontario District Soccer League, the Georgetown IGA mosquito Meteors visited Acton, beating the home team by 10-2.

In the first attack, Nicky Varricchio sped down the right wing and crossed the ball to Chris Cambouris, who drove the ball wide of the diving goalkeeper. With the impetus of an early goal, the Meteors continued to apply pressure and forced many corners. From one of these, captain Mike Melville controlled the ball, turned on a dime and scored with a low shot after 15 minutes. Within one minute, Chris Cambouris scored the winning goal from a cross by Steve Alchin.

Meanwhile, the defence was ably containing the advances of the enthusiastic Acton side. Richard Herrera displayed tackles of biting ferocity in the middle, while Sandy Jobin-Bevans and Bob Donker on the flanks forced their opponents into wide positions from which it was difficult to produce a challenging attempt on goal. With this defensive security providing an essential basis for confident team play, an intricate left-wing passing move instigated by Paul St. Pierre released Steve Alchin. He ran unhesitatingly to goal and

slipped the ball into the corner of the net.

SUPERB SAVES
With a healthy 4-0 lead, the Meteors began the second half with some careless play born of overconfidence. They were quickly punished when Michael Thompson reduced the deficit and, were it not for a couple of superb saves by Jimmy English in the visitors' net, the Acton squad would have climbed back into close contention. During this period, Andre Thibault relieved the pressure with a cunning long pass to Nicky Varricchio, who ran half the length of the pitch to restore the four goal lead. Acton were not discouraged and almost immediately responded with a high shot by Chris McGeorge, courtesy of an errant pass by a Meteor player.

At last the visitors reasserted their superiority, with Doug Raymond and Rich Sowers working hard in defence to swing the momentum back to its first-half direction. Consequently, the midfield was able to set up attacks, such as the pass from Bob Donker to Mike Melville which gave the Georgetown team a 6-2 lead. On the right wing, John Placido was growing in confidence and showing his speed both on and off the ball, while on the left Paul St. Pierre was making intelligent overlapping runs, one of which added another goal to the visitors' tally.

In the last five minutes, the Meteors combined to give Brian Doherty a rapid hat-trick. His first goal followed a dribble and cross by Robbie Lockhurst, his second was an individual effort, and the third was a cool penalty shot following a trip.

It is too early to tell if the Meteors will prove to be a powerful team this season. However, the determination displayed by the defence and midfield suggests that more goals will result if overconfidence is avoided and team play emphasized.

Cricketers win season opener

After two cancellations in the previous weekends due to the unfit condition of the playing field the Georgetown cricketers were finally able to play the first game of the 1984 season in the Hamilton and District Cricket League at Stewarttown on Saturday. They defeated the visiting team, Welland, by the wide margin of 124 runs.

This game was almost cancelled too, but prior to the start the Georgetown players brought their lawnmowers and rented a power roller, working feverishly for 3½ hours to get the field in satisfactory condition just before the game got underway at 1:30 p.m.

Welland won the toss and made the unpardonable error of sending in the local team to bat. The Georgetown batsmen were off to a shaky start and lost two wickets for 18 runs but Nirvan Balkisson and Shaker 'Shawn' Jahoor battled brilliantly and staged a recovery. Both batsmen were out when the score was 88 runs with Balkisson contributing 39 including three 'fours' and Jahoor 34 with the same number of boundaries.

Ashok Kumar, who has always relished the bowling of Welland, continued the onslaught and hit a six and two 'fours' in his innings of 26 runs. When he was out at the score of 118 runs for nine wickets, Clyde Samaroo and the captain, Ashley Windsor came together and established a record of 52 runs for a last wicket partnership before Windsor was caught in attempting to hit out. The Georgetown total was 170 runs, of which Windsor contributed 30 runs. Clyde Samaroo, who also batted splendidly, was undefeated with 17 runs.

S. Chase was the only successful Welland bowler and he ended up by taking four wickets for 23 runs. At their turn to bat Welland found themselves in deep trouble and in the first ball Nirvan Balkisson bowled the opening batsman. He continued

the fiery attack and in his third over, before a run had been scored off his bowling, he took the second wicket

Wickets continued to fall at regular intervals and after Balkisson and Windsor were taken off, left-arm bowler Clyde Samaroo and David Anthony continued to mesmerize the Welland batsman. The only batsman to reach double figures was 90-year old "Pop" Smith with 12 runs as the entire team was out for 46 runs thus losing to Georgetown by 124 runs.

For Georgetown, N. Balkisson, who opened the bowling, skittled three wickets for four runs in seven overs while Clyde Samaroo had three wickets for eight runs in 6-2 overs and Dave Anthony three wickets for four runs in five overs.

The next game will be played against Guelph C.C. on Saturday, June 16 and the team will be selected from the following: A. Windsor (capt.), S. Jahoor (v. capt.), A. Kumar, A. Dean, N. Samaroo, C. Samaroo, D. Anthony, L. Moolchan, N. Balkisson, D. Balkisson, M. Soondarlal and P. Lall.

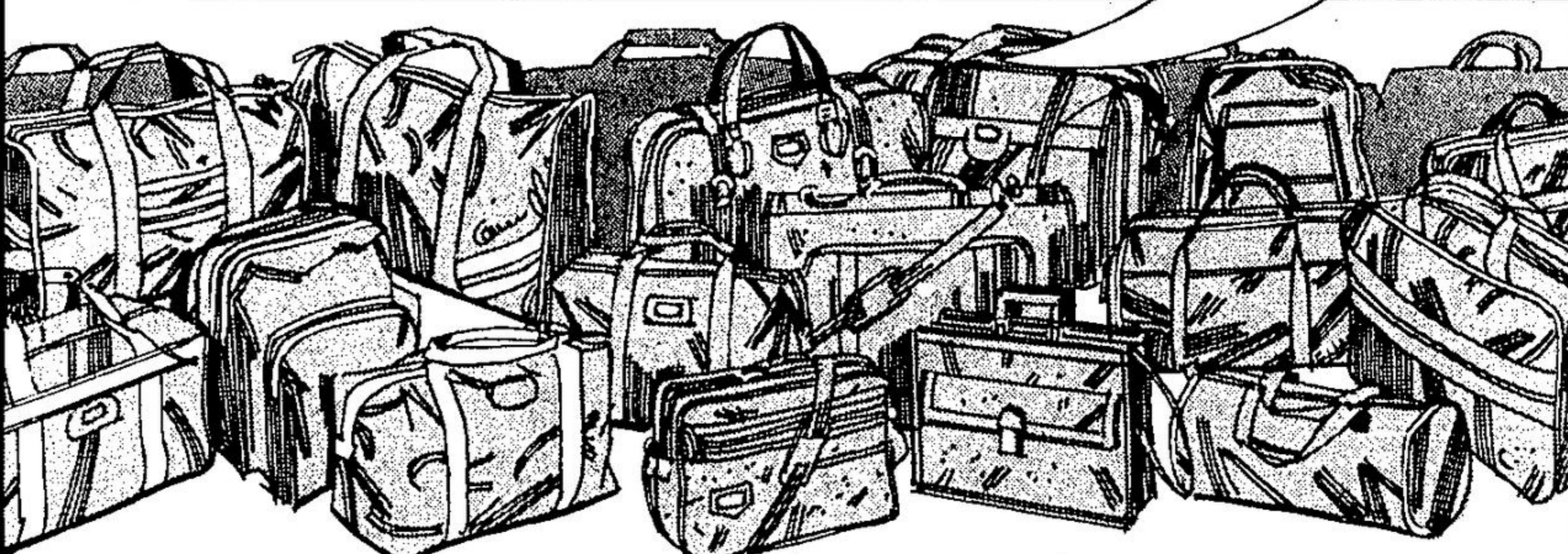
